Likewise, our sitting Commander in Chief, Gene Mortorff who had a mild stroke in early February is


recovering nicely and back on the road with his duties as our big boss for the year!

### [Message from our Camp Commander](#)

Here we are in March of 2016 with winter nearly behind us and spring quickly approaching. I trust your 2015-2016 holiday season was happily shared and enjoyed in the company of family and friends. Now we find ourselves with nearly a quarter of the year passed. During our Camp's February meeting brother David Klinepeter, our camp historian, briefly touched on the fact President Lincoln had a firm belief that God's hand was in the war, God had his own purposes, and in times of great change and upheaval those purposes of God could be quite different than those of man. When Brother Klinepeter said that, I was reminded of President Lincoln's 2<sup>nd</sup> Inaugural address, given on March 4, 1864. Since this is the month of March, it seemed appropriate to give some reflection on the meaning Lincoln meant to convey during that eventful day.

The president said, that "on the occasion corresponding to this four years ago" (i.e. the beginning of his presidency in 1861) all thoughts were directed to the impending civil war. He said both sides dreaded it and all tried to avert it. One side (the South), however, would make war rather than let the nation live, the other (the North) would accept war rather than let the nation perish; "and the war came". The president went on to say that both sides read the same Bible and prayed to the same God, and invoked his aide against the other. Of course the prayers of both sides could not be answered, since God is both merciful and just.



Lincoln then went on to say something rather profound; after saying that the prayers of both could not be answered; he said with true humility, and with great insight that the "*prayers of neither has been answered fully*". In saying this, Lincoln recognized that his past understanding, and past purposes differed from those of God; consequently the events that had actually transpired were different from those that he had hoped for. When Lincoln gave this speech, his assassination and subsequent death were a mere 40 days away. Of course he could have not known this, but his work on this earth was nearly finished, and the important things he had needed to accomplish had been done. I believe at this point Lincoln could see that the war could not have ended until all purposes for the war had been realized. Nearly at the end of his own life, I believe he could see the key to those purposes as follows:

- From April 1861 till August of 1862 the North had been fighting for "Union"; a gallant, but not totally sufficient reason for all the death and loss; and probably not sufficient for God's purposes; *and so the war continued.*
- In September 1862, Lincoln announced the Emancipation Proclamation, freeing all slaves in those areas still in rebellion on January 1, 1863. With this Proclamation, the war reached a new moral level; the only problem was, that as a war measure, the Proclamation could not guarantee a return of slavery after the war in the rebellious states, and it certainly did nothing to remove slavery in states loyal to the

union (Kentucky, Delaware, Missouri, and Maryland). It also did not touch those areas of the South occupied by the Union army on January 1, 1863, as those areas were no longer in rebellion. To leave slavery in loyal states alone, and conquered parts of the South was like, as the Bible would say, Seeing the speck in your neighbors eye, but not seeing the log in one's own eye. Lincoln knew his bible very well, quoted extended passages from it during his 2<sup>nd</sup> inaugural, and I believe realized at this point of the war, the Proclamation only addressed God's purposes partially, and not completely, *and so the war continued.*


- Knowing the Emancipation Proclamation would be vulnerable after the war, Lincoln pushed very hard for the 13<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Constitution, the complete and total abolishment of slavery in the United States. After winning the November 1864 elections, and having very solid Republican majorities in the House and Senate, he also knew that the Amendment would certainly pass after the new members took their seats in March of 1865. But this was not the way he wanted it; Lincoln wished that the current House and Senate would pass the Amendment; that both Democrats and Republicans would pass this historic measure together; with wise strategy, and a few twisted arms, Lincoln's wishes were realized and the Amendment was passed in December of 1864 with both Republicans and some Democrats giving the needed votes. After this, all the death and all the loss of the war had some higher purpose; freedom of all men, for all time. I believe Lincoln believed at this point, that God's purposes had been met, at least so far as "God gives us to see the right"; the Union had been saved, and all men everywhere in the United States would be free; *and so the war would soon end.*

I encourage you all to read Lincoln's 2<sup>nd</sup> Inaugural address; it is a document reflecting both great wisdom and humility. A lesson for us all, even today. I have enclosed a photograph of President Lincoln giving his speech, on that March morning of 1864. One last

historical footnote. It is said that the weather had been dark and raining for days before the speech. The ground was soggy and the skies were dark when the speech began; but then, while the President delivered his speech, the skies opened up brightly and the sun began to shine through. Perhaps, at that moment, this was heavens message, God's wink, that Man's and God's purposes were finally aligned.



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THE YOUNGEST GENERAL IN THE CIVIL WAR

NATIONAL HERO AT TWENTY TWO GALUSHA PENNYPACKER

He was born June 1, 1843 at Valley Forge, Pa in a house once occupied by General George Washington. At seventeen he joined the local Militia. In August 1861 he was in Company A, 97th Regiment Penna Volunteers. From then on until the close of the war the young soldier saw continuous service in the field except during the periods when recovering from his wounds. He was wounded in action fourteen times. Several of his wounds were quite serious. He was always at the forefront of his troops. His command was always "come" never "go".

General Pennypacker's career reached its peak on January 15, 1865 at the assault and capture of Fort Fisher in North Carolina. He was seriously wounded

there and was taken to Fort Fisher hospital. Because of his actions at Fort Fisher Congress awarded him the Congressional Medal of Honor. On February 18, 1865 Secretary of War Stanton appointed Pennypacker to the full rank of Brigadier General of Volunteers. He became the youngest officer in the Union or Confederate Army to attain that rank. On October 1, 1916 he bled to death from a wound received at Fort Fisher, fifty one years before. It had never properly healed. --- DJK
