

### An Amazing Rescue From Slavery

During the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, the abolitionist movement gained strength in the Northern United States. Free states prohibited slavery, but many of those living in slave states were forced to suffer backbreaking work and

constant forms of degradation. In 1847, one heroic mother, a freed slave, received a letter from the master of her two daughters. She had given birth to the girls while still a slave, making her daughters slaves according to the law. In the letter, the master threatened to sell the girls and send them to Louisiana unless she could raise \$400 to buy their freedom. She had no way to get the money but was determined to save her daughters. This is her story, told from clippings from the Green-Mountain Freeman in October 1847.

After finding a few men who were sympathetic to her story, and able to help transport and hide the girls after their rescue, the mother devised a rescue plan. She immediately set out on foot, walking about 35 miles to the home where her girls were kept. Arriving at night, she waited in the woods until the following morning. Not wanting to raise suspicion, she went to the house as she always did when she visited her children. "I stayed there on Saturday and Sunday, til Monday evening; cooked and washed for them, and then bid my children goodbye, as if I should never see them again; for I told 'master' that I could not raise the money."



*Green Mountain Freeman, October 14, 1847.* After leaving the house, the mother again hid in the woods until 11:00 pm. As she quietly approached the house, two dogs began to bark furiously. "I stopped a moment, and hid behind the fence, and saw 'master' get up and open the window, and look out. Not seeing anything, he shut down the window. I waited till I thought he was asleep, and then went forward. I hurried quick into the cellar kitchen, where my children slept."

She waited until she heard the master snoring, then quietly woke the children and told them not to speak a word. "I got on their clothes as soon as I could, and fearing that if I went out by the door the dogs would bark again, I determined to go out by the back window. I found it fastened. I got up on the window sill to take out the nail, and as I was pulling at it, I prayed, 'O Lord, defend me and my dear children this night; I commit myself and them to thee.' At length I got out the nail, and opened the window, and lifted my children out; and then got out myself. The two dogs were there, but they only stood and looked at us, and never even growled."

The three of them ran through the garden, over three different fences and palings, and walked four miles to a waiting carriage, reaching it about 1:00 am. Boarding the carriage, they drove as fast as they could towards the city, but had no intention of going to the city, "For I knew that 'master' would be there as soon as he could, after he waked up and found the children gone," said the mother. Instead, the three were secreted in a series of safe houses and transported first to Pennsylvania and then to Boston. Once in Boston, the mother was able to obtain work and her daughters enrolled in school and learned to read and sew.

Jeff provided handouts listing each battle's major commanders, the number of troops engaged and casualty figures. A very interesting fact that he mentioned is the General Grant conquered 45,000 square miles of land in the Spring of 1862, which is a land area roughly the size of Pennsylvania! Brother Jeff's presentation was well researched and very interesting, as always.

### Prospects Good For Clear Skies

The generally cloudy, mild and humid weather today is expected to give way to cooler, drier and generally fair weather tomorrow. Occasional rain was forecast for tonight.

Harrisburg's two-day observance of Memorial Day will open tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock with the annual church services in St. Patrick's Cathedral, to be followed at 2.30 p. m. by a combined memorial program and tree-planting ceremony, in honor of World War II veterans, at the Reservoir Park Bandshell.

In a short service at 9.45 a. m., members of Camp 15, the 6th Infantry Field Music and Company G. 6th Regiment, Sons of Veterans' Reserve, will place a memorial wreath at the Gen. John F. Hartranft monument in the Capitol Plaza after which they will parade to the cathedral. Headed by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, veterans' groups will meet at City Hall at 10.15 a. m. and march to the church via Walnut,

## Legion Band Concert

Prior to the afternoon services planned by Post 27, American Legion, the Memorial Grove Committee and the City Park Department, a short concert will be given by the Post 27 Band under the direction of Allen Quirk. The Rev. Dr. Phillip David Bookstaber, of Temple Ohev Sholom, will give the invocation opening the memorial program. The Harrisburg Symphony Choir, directed by Reginald F. Lunt, will sing "America the Beautiful" and "One World," with Richard Duffan, tenor, and Frances Palb, contralto, as soloists. Organ selections will be played by Mary Smith Kline.

John H. Moody, chairman of the program committee, will introduce guests and the speaker, Father Joseph Timothy O'Callahan, S. J., chaplain on the USS Franklin when it was bombed by the Japanese. Honor guests will include three local survivors of the Franklin's bombing: Anthony J. Bozis, 618 Boas street, city policeman; Robert L. Shaffer, 1409 North Front street, and Harold A. Karl, 104 Second street, Oberlin. Following Father Callahan's talk, the choir will sing "Lo, a Voice to Heaven Sounding."

Congressman John C. Kunkel will be the speaker at the planting of a double-flowering Oriental cherry tree, on the hill above the Ralph Feldser Memorial Bandshell, the first of a 6000-tree memorial to Harrisburg veterans and those who lost their lives in World War II. Dr. William J. Ross, representing City Park Director Robert C. Leitner, will preside at this ceremony

## Wage Hike Ends Chrysler Strike

DETROIT, May 29.—The United Auto Workers (CIO) claimed a "resounding victory" today in winning a 13-cent-an-hour wage increase to end the 17-day strike of 73,000 Chrysler Corporation employes.

The union said the increase should not cause a rise in car prices. It claimed Chrysler could pay the increase, cut prices \$120 per car and still make a 6 per cent. profit.

The third round wage agreement, reached last night, ended the strike at midnight.

Chrysler officials said production of Chrysler, Dodge, Plymouth and DeSoto passenger cars and Dodge trucks probably would get underway in about a week.

## Court Orders One Year Abstinence for Phil Baker

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., May 29.—Radio Comedian Phil Baker has a court-ordered year of abstinence ahead of him.

City Judge Charles J. Griffin, in fining Baker \$200 yesterday on a drunk-in-auto charge, also directed him to stay away from liquor for a year. A drunk driving charge was dismissed. Baker had pleaded guilty to both the misdemeanor counts.

He was arrested May 20 while driving home from a party marking his 35th year in show business.

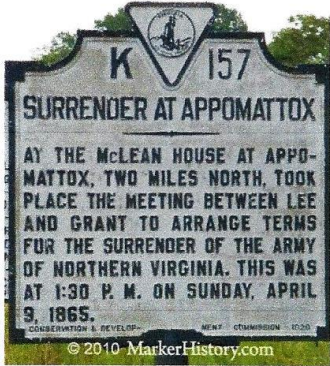

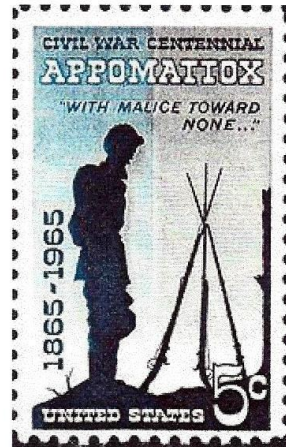
