To a packed house, Brother Floyd Demmy was the speaker of the evening at the Central PA WWII Roundtable in Hummelstown April 3rd. Demmy, in his Ike Uniform opened with remarks prior to WWII years, regarding making potato pealing soup, rationing

anything and everything, basic training down south, departing New York for Europe, scared of potential Uboat threat across the North Atlantic; trucked from France into Germany, weary of snipers and daily German shelling to facing the enemy in the streets of every small German town with his half-track squad of the 54th armored infantry battalion, one of many units of the 10th Armored Division (Tigers) of Patton's Third Army.




Kline family [Tony and Greg] upon loss of Uncle, Brother and Brother-n-law, Arthur Swartz, 74 of Milton.
