

Harrisburg -

The National Civil War Museum, Lincoln Circle in Reservoir Park – New comprehensive museum uses a variety of interpretive tools to tell the entire story of the war. Exhibits with dioramas, first-rate artifacts and audiovisual presentations tell the stories of the battles, camp life, black soldiers, medicine, slavery, music and much more. Open Monday-Saturday 10 am–5 pm, Sunday noon-5 pm. (Closed Mondays and Tuesdays Labor Day–March 31.) \$8 adult admission, \$25 family pass. 717-260-1861 or toll-free 866-258-4729.

The State Museum of Pennsylvania, 300 North St., near the State Capitol – Fine Civil War exhibit features Peter Frederick Rothermel's famous mural of Pickett's Charge at the Battle of Gettysburg. Open Tuesday-Saturday 9 am-5 pm, Sunday noon-5 pm. Free. 717-787-4979.

Gettysburg -

The visitor center features an excellent, well-organized museum, ranger help, a book store and an electronic map of the battlefield (\$4 adults for map). Also available at the visitor center is personal guide service, authorized by the park. Hire a guide for two hours for up to six people for \$45. Reservations (call 717-334-4474) are taken for the service, which is busy at times.

The Cyclorama is closed for restoration. It will reopen in the new park visitor center scheduled for 2008.

Free ranger-led walking tours from the visitor center are offered daily. Visitor center open 8 am-5 pm daily. Expanded hours during the summer season. Park open 6 am–10 pm daily (6 am–7 pm Nov 1–March 31). 717-334-1124.

Band of Brothers come to Pennsylvania

The crowd in the lobby of the Lycoming College Academic Center stood in hushed silence, staring at the three aged men sitting at a long table. Had a person encountered these men sitting on a park bench somewhere, they might have seemed like any other elderly gentlemen. They were indeed gentlemen - and they were legends.

Buck Compton, Don Malarkey, and Clancy Lyall served in Easy Company, 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division, U.S. Army during World War II. The pen of the late historian Stephen E. Ambrose immortalized this unit in the landmark book, "Band of Brothers." The HBO adaptation of Ambrose's book turned the surviving veterans of Easy Company into cultural icons.



When I learned that these old soldiers were scheduled to appear in Williamsport. I decided to make the trip on a Saturday evening to see them. I took with me my hardcover S&S Classic Edition of Band of Brothers, already signed by the much beloved and admired commander of Easy Company, Major Dick Winters. I hoped to have Compton, Malarkey, and Lyall sign it as well.

When I first saw them, I noted the difference in their appearances. Malarkey's snow-white hair matched his white jacket adorned with the Screaming Eagle emblem of the 101st Airborne. Compton appeared slightly frail, but smilingly acknowledged all visitors and autograph seekers. Lyall, wearing a black baseball cap and with his lovely wife sitting nearby, joked and smiled as well. Lyall served in three wars - World War II, Korea, and Vietnam.

I arrived fairly early, and fell into the line of visitors organized by the event coordinators. By the time I left, the line stretched around the lobby and nearly doubled back upon itself. Standing patiently in line were several active duty military personnel in their uniforms, as well as others who were clearly veterans of other conflicts, with caps and shirts emblazoned with unit insignias.

The long line did not allow for much interaction with the three men, but I shook each of their hands after they signed my book. I wondered what thoughts must go through their minds at events such as the one I attended at Williamsport. In 1944, these men were fighting for their lives in the harsh snows of Bastogne during the Battle of the Bulge - and now, in 2007, nearly 63 years later, they sign autographs and pose for pictures like

Hollywood superstars.

The event organizers sold numbered prints, glossy photographs, and other items to raise money for the Intrepid Fallen Heroes Fund, a worthy cause that, when the soldiers of Easy Company came home from their war, did not exist. A man and his son standing behind me in line bought one of the prints for the veterans to sign, and I secretly longed for some additional wall space at home to hang such a print myself.

My book now features the signatures of four Easy Company veterans, but the book itself is merely a keepsake of something more important. It is a remembrance of an encounter with history. I can look at the book and not only read the story of Easy Company, but recall the evening that I shook hands with Buck Compton, Don Malarkey, and Clancy Lyall. In years to come, I can tell my daughter about this special evening, and pass the book along to her.

From this day to the ending of the world, But rememberedwe in it shall be We few, we happy few, we band of brothers; For he to-day that sheds his blood with me brother... Camp 15 Charters

Name of Camp, General John F. Hartranft was not inscribed on this First charter bestowed upon Camp 15, Sons of Veterans of the Civil War.

Lower seal is black. Signatures affixed in February 1885, Erie Pennsylvania, The HQ - 2nd Grand Division of the SUV heir to GAR.

This second charter issued to Camp 15 also is without the name of General John F. Hartranft.

This SUV charter with gold seal was appropriately signed during July 1887 at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

Notice the inscribed names of members of Camp 15. This charter is in better shape than charters #1 and #3.

This charter is inscribed to Gen General John F. Hartranft, Camp 15 of Department of Pennsylvania.

Signatures affixed April 1889 at Reading, Pennsylvania.



You may have seen this 4th Camp 15 charter on display at one of our annual Christmas gatherings. This charter has been issued to the Camp of the "Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War".

This SONS charter was professionally restored and presented to Camp 15 by Mr. and Mrs. Lee F. Walters.

Out of the Past

President Franklin D. Roosevelt Speech and D-Day Prayer - June 6, 1944

If interested, the link below will take you to a very touching speech and prayer. You can read the entire thing. Or, you can click to hear the speech in his own words.

The World War II soldiers, known as the "Greatest Generation." There are very few left from that era. ----Lest We Forget !!

This is the prayer originally entitled "Let Our Hearts Be Stout" written by President Franklin D. Roosevelt as Allied troops were invading German-occupied Europe during World War II. The prayer was read to the nation on radio on the evening of D-Day, June 6, 1944, while American, British and Canadian troops were fighting to establish beach heads on the coast of Normandy in France.

The previous night, June 5, the President had also been on the radio to announce that Allied troops had entered Rome. The spectacular news that Rome had been liberated was quickly surpassed by news of the gigantic D-Day invasion which began at 6:30 a.m. on June 6. By midnight about 57,000 American and 75,000 British and Canadian soldiers had gotten ashore. <u>Allied Iosses on</u> D-Day included 2,500 killed and 8,500 wounded.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/GAR HISTORIAN, by Dave Klinepeter

The week of (Aug 9-12, 2007) was the National Encampment of the Sons of Union Veterans in St. Louis. If everything goes as hoped, **Brother Charles Kuhn** will become National Commander-in Chief of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. He is a member of Hartranft Camp 15.

In 1949, at Indianapolis In., **John H. Runkle**, a member of Hartranft Camp 15 became National Commanderin-Chief of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. that occasion was very special as it was the 83rd National encampment of the GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC. THIS WAS THE *FINAL* ENCAMPMENT OF THE GAR. The date was August 28-September 1, 1949.



There were a number of Union Veterans of the Civil War living but were in poor health, most were over 100 years in age and unable to travel.

Yes, I was at Indianapolis. As long as I knew John Runkle, he never went to any National or State Encampment without the Fife and Drum Corp. There were about 12 members of the Drum Corp in attendance. Most of us were too young to be delegates at the Sons Encampment, so we did sightseeing! The one evening at suppertime we went to the Claypool Hotel, (headquarters for the GAR boys), to play for them. Albert Woolson was the only one in the lobby. Major John H. Runkle took Harry Runkle's drum and placed it between Albert Woolson's legs than gave him a pair of drumsticks. It was a special privilege to have him play along with us. On August 29, 1949, the Post Office put out a first day issue stamp. There were many venders selling special envelopes for the occasion. I did buy 27 different envelopes, went into the post office there, bought the stamps and LICKED every one (no peel off stamps during that era). Then they were handed to the clerk to be canceled.

On Wed August 31, 1949 at 6:30 pm, the last parade for the Grand Army of the Republic stepped off with Commander-in-Chief Theodore Penland's car in the lead. Next in the line was the United States Marine Corp Band from Washington D.C. in full dress parade uniforms, followed by the 6th Infantry Field Music, Sons of Veterans Reserves from Harrisburg, Pa and led by Major John H. Runkle. This was the only time I remember that the Fife and Drum Corp did beat our drums. We enjoyed marching to the music of the Marine Band. As the parade was coming to an end, it started to thunder and lightning. The sound effects were likened to cannon firing in battle. It did rain a bit.

Note, As I write about John Runkle, the SUVCW, the SVR, the Drum Corp, and Camp 15, there is no way to separate them. They all interwoven. It is difficult to put things in proper sequence. As I write about items, it causes me to remember other things we did together. I also realize that to the older members [some of this is a repeat]; however, I wanted our newer members of Camp 15 to know about the older ones who made strong commitments over many years to keep the Sons of Union Veterans going and to keep alive the memories of all the Union Veterans as well as the Grand Army of the Republic, our father organization. --- DJK
