I would like to extend a hearty



In the January 2007 edition of The Civil War



News, Janice Mullin, Director of The National Civil War Museum, responded to a highly critical letter to the editor. In her response, Mullin acknowledged the stark realities with which the museum is coping, and issued a plea for support, "While the

museum does need to operate within a tightly controlled budget (like most museums), we at the museum are continuing to strive to offer our visitors and the community the most dynamic experience it is possible to give...neither the board nor I accept that the museum is 'destined to fail,' although we do accept that a lot of work and improvements still need to be made. The positive support of the Civil War community is key to the survival and success of the museum."

We are indeed privileged to be able to hold our Camp meetings at The National Civil War Museum. Even with its drawbacks (it is not the easiest building to locate in Harrisburg), the museum is a very impressive facility, and a significant asset to the greater Susquehanna Valley. The museum brings a variety of unique historical programs to our area, including numerous encampments and demonstrations by living historians, both Union and Confederate.



Discussion of the sale of the seven reproduction 45.70 rifles was postponed because of Commander Prye's absence. David Klinepeter did report that according to his son, Michael, they are the top-of-the-line firearms worth about \$800 each. The Camp is considering replacing them with three 1873 Springfield reproductions worth about \$500 each. (45.70's are not suitable for Civil War era use).

Lee and Charlotte Walters will no longer be organizing the Camp's holiday party. A room at Doc Holliday's has been reserved for our Sunday, December 9, 2007 annual party. I REMEMBER WHEN



By the time you get this newsletter Abraham Lincoln's birthday will probably be passed. Camp 112 Gettysburg, Pa Lincoln luncheon will be over. I remember during the 1940s General Hartranft Camp 15 SUVCW and Auxiliary 7 of Harrisburg, Pa held Lincoln Banquets. They were

usually held the Saturday evening before February 12, Lincoln's Birthday. Most of the ones I attended were at the (former) **Penn Harris Hotel** (SEE

PHOTO) located at 3rd and Walnut Street, in Harrisburg, Pa. In those days the hotels were large and grand. The banquetballroom was very beautiful. I do not know how many years John H. Runkle was on the Banquet committee, but I do know Major John H. Runkle always took a number of the Harrisburg



Fife and Drum Corps $(6^{th}$ Infantry Field Music SVR) boys along to such affairs. While the guests arrived we would play for their entertainment.

It was also our pleasure to escort the officers of the Sons of Union Veterans, Allied Organizations of the Grand Army of the Republic and honored guests to the head table. After the banquet and speeches were finished, the Drum Corps would take up their instruments and again entertain. Those present

never seemed to tire of listening to the old Civil War songs. Over the years Major Runkle took the Drum Corps to other Lincoln Banquets in Reading, Philadelphia, Lancaster, York, Gettysburg, and other places too. --- DJK

<u>Continuation on GAR series</u> by David J. Klinepeter HISTORY OF THE <u>GRAND ARMY</u> OF THE REPUBLIC, Part 2

The first official National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was held at Indianapolis, Indiana on November 20, 1866. General Stephen A Hurlbut was the first actual Commander-in-chief-elected by 288 the delegates in attendance. There was no National Encampment held in 1867 but in 1868 General John Α. Logan was elected Commander-in-chief and served 3 years. It was in 1868 General Logan issued general order number 11 establishing May 30th as Decoration Day, later known as Memorial Day, to remember the fallen comrades and strew their graves with flowers. The Grand Army floundered in the beginning years under the weight of politics. It contained members of both political parties of which "The Boys in Blue", (Republican party), dominated every Veterans meeting, the membership began to decline until a resolution was passed at the National Encampment in 1869 calling for the elimination of any political debate at any National, State and local Post function. The resolution was approved at all levels but it took almost ten years before politics was silenced. The GAR began to grow quite strong, welding an influence far beyond its true power. They were credited with swaying the balance of power over 50 years. Until 1901 (with the death of President McKinley) six of the seven U.S. Presidents elected were Civil War Veterans. Two slogans used against the Grand Army were, "The GAR saved the country, now they want to own it", and it was called, "The Grand Army of the Republicans". As powerful as the GAR was to become they would never

count more than thirty two per cent of the Union Veterans as members.

In 1869 the GAR membership badge was redesigned. (See below) Series to be continued. --- DJK.





republic, and that therefore in the early days the taint of partisanship which became attached to the association, particularly in the central West, led to the loss of power and practical dismemberment of the order. Indeed, so loosely was the line then drawn that at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Conven-tion in Pittsburg, in September, 1866, the recently organized department of the Grand Army of the Republic in Indiana was distinctly represented, and when a committee was appointed to formulate a plan for a national political organization, the Grand Army was one of the bodies from which a representative was selected. During the sessions of this convention a number of prominent soldiers from the eastern states were obligated in the work of the Grand Army and returned home to begin the institution of posts. But with this transient and altogether natural confusion in the beginning, the association of the Grand Army of the Republic with politics ended. When the work of the political veteran organizations of that period ended with the results of the presidential campaign of 1868, many of them formed the nucleus for Grand Army posts, and the latter organization made its position clear by the declaration of the National Encampment in January, 1868, that it did "not design to make nominations for office, nor to use its influence as a secret organization for partisan purposes." One year later an amendment to the rules and regulations was adopted,

declaring that "no officer or comrade of the Grand Army of the Republic shall in any manner use this organization for partisan purposes, and no discussion of partisan questions shall be permitted at any of its meetings, nor shall any nominations for political office be made."



Among the men who during the days of their service gave much thought to the idea of perpetuating the associations of the war period, and providing mutual aid in the future by means of a general organization of the veterans, was Dr. Benjamin Franklin Stephenson, surgeon of the 14th



Illinois Infantry. In Chaplain W. J. Ruttledge of the same regiment, Dr. Stephenson found a cordial sympathizer in the proposition, and early in the spring of 1866 the two met in Springfield, Illinois, for consultation as to plans for carrying out their cherished idea. Dr. Stephenson, who must be regarded as the father of the Grand Army of the Republic, was already entering upon the preliminary work with the zeal of an enthusiast. He endeavored to interest whoever of his former associates he met in his project; he procured copies of the ritual of soldier organizations already formed, and in the latter part of

ritual was taken to Decatur to be printed, for the reason that the office of the *Trib*une there was in the hands of veterans and it was thought that the desired secrecy might thereby be made more secure. This mechanical work attracted the attention of a number of Decatur soldiers, with the result of procuring a list of twelve, to whom, under date of April 6, 1866, a charter was granted, constituting Post 1 of Decatur, District of Macon, Department of Illinois, Grand Army of the Republic. The name of Dr. Stephenson is appended to this charter, and by a justifiable fiction he is designated as "Commander of Department." Dr. Stephen-

1865 had outlined a form for use in the proposed new order; he invited several others to assist him in this work, and after much consultation a ritual was completed, and probably a dozen veterans were obligated therein, forming the group of original members. But chance carried the formal organization of the first post away from the actual birthplace of the order. The

son was a native of Illinois, born in 1822; he served as surgeon of the 14th Illinois from April 7, 1862, to June 24, 1864, the date of expiration of its three years term. He died at Rock Creek, August 30, 1871, his eyes not having beheld the later realization of his enthusiastic dream of an organization including the majority of that mighty host of freemen enlisted in defence of the unity of the republic. He had carefully planted good seed, had seen the springing into life of a magical growth, had mourned the desolating blast which swept the rising organization almost absolutely from the face of his own western states, but it was not given to him to watch

and witness the splendid resurrection to strength and power which has come within the past decade.

The original plan of organization was cumbersome, including in addition to the present system of posts, departments (state and national), a district or county government, with a distinct list of officers, the latter having direct supervision of the posts.
