Minutes of the meeting of General John F. Hartranft Camp #15 Sunday, January 20, 2008 National Civil War Museum, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania --- The Pennsylvania Ballroom ---

The January meeting was called to order at 2:05 pm by Commander Prye.

The minutes from the last meeting [November] were read and approved.

Commander Prye asked for information on any ailing brothers or family members in distress. Brother Haley continues to undergo treatments for his condition, which are said to be taking a heavy toll on his stamina and well-being.

Under reports from Visiting Committees, Department Commander Walters reported that SUVCW Camp #8 was recently forced out of its current meeting place and relocated its records and collections at a local municipal building, an arrangement that is expected to be permanent. Chaplain Demmy reported that the staff of the National Civil War Museum was willing to allow Camp #15 to use the board room at the museum, as long as a paying customer did not desire to use the room at the same time.

Following a voice vote to permit the installation of two new brothers, Dave Demmy Jr. and Jon Demmy, Acting Guide John Deppen brought the candidates forward, and Chaplain Demmy (the proud father) swore them in. The Camp was delighted to welcome the young men, and we were all proud to celebrate this wonderful occasion with the Demmy family.

Acting Secretary Deppen summarized two communications, one from National C-in-C Kuhn, and one from Department Commander Walters. The complete text of the communications will be kept on file.

Under unfinished business, the Camp voted to purchase a brick on behalf of the Camp, to be installed at the National Civil War Museum. Also, the Camp voted to request that Secretary Larry Sheibley obtain new cost estimates for copying and binding the planned history of Camp #15. Secretary Sheibley obtained initial costs based on a quantity of 75 – after discussion, the brothers recommended that we make 125 copies, in the expectation that we will need more to distribute to new inductees and other interested parties. Commander Prye will check on his supply of large envelopes to see if we might utilize these envelopes in order to save on shipping costs for the new history book.

Brother Floyd Demmy, appearing in his World War II U.S. Army "Ike" uniform bearing the insignias of the 10th Armored Division and the 3rd Army, spoke briefly about his war experience, and about the forthcoming reenactment of the Battle of the Bugle at Fort Indiantown Gap, to be held on Saturday, January 26. Brother Demmy commented about last year's reenactment, that he had not seen that many German uniforms since the war.

Treasurer Demmy reported that Camp #15 currently has a balance of \$3,208.00. He also cautioned the Camp to remember that much of this money will be turned over to Department and National as Capita Tax. He reminded the brothers present that Camp #15 makes little if any money from annual dues, and that it is important for everyone to pay their dues in a timely fashion. The Treasurer's Report was unanimously approved and accepted.

Under new business, Department Commander Walters swore in Camp #15's new slate of officers. Our new commander, Greg Kline, in his first action as commander, thanked Past Commander Prye for his service and leadership during his term. Commander Kline reminded everyone that Camp #15 is not "his" camp, but "our" camp, and that he welcomes ideas for new projects and events.

Camp #15 received an invitation from the Historical Society of Montgomery County to participate in a wreath-laying at Montgomery Cemetery on Saturday, May 24. Since this date conflicts with the Camp's long-established date of helping to place flags on Civil War veterans' graves in Harrisburg, Commander Kline asked that brothers think about how we want to respond to the Society's request. A small delegation might be sent to Norristown, while a party of volunteers will work on the flag project.

Department Commander Walters asked that, because of the hard work done on behalf of Camp #15's website by new brother[Dave] Demmy – work that was done on a volunteer basis long before he applied to be a member – the Camp pay the initiation fee and first year's dues for him. The motion was approved unanimously.

Thoughts following the Secretary's minutes above

Out-going Commander, Donnie Prye, expressed an *emotional*, **heartfelt thanks** to the Camp for their support to him during his tenure as Camp Commander.

Since the meeting, the treasury as paid the National Civil War Museum for a Brick in honor of Camp 15 SUVCW. Other expenditures included purchase of 5 additional membership badges, office supplies and *Hartranft Herald* production items too. When the brick is installed at National Civil War Museum, your *Hartranft Herald* will post photos for your viewing.

In addition, our webmaster pondered the high bid of \$1200 to produce **75** copies of our history book in full color vs. under \$400 for non-color except Cover sheets A few calculations later, he arrived at an under \$900 figure for **125** copies in full color including paper, transparent covers, ink & printing and *binding* in $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ format. So now the Camp has a choice to pay approximately \$400 for black and white or under \$900 for full color; and control production ourselves! It also means we could reproduce future copies as desired. The February meeting will entertain a motion relative to this paragraph and subsequently act upon that motion.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/GAR HISTORIAN

On Saturday January 26th I took a trip to Fort Indiantown Gap to see a reenactment of the Battle of the Bulge in World War II. The battle area was small but with shouting, gunfire, commotion and some imagination it was realistic. Missing was the (normal) bitter cold and lots more snow (associated with Fort Indiantown Gap in January). While walking around I observed several groups of reenactors talking to older veterans about their experiences during the war. Brother Floyd Demmy was, no doubt, approached about his experiences. A number of members of Camp 15 were in attendance. I complimented a number of the participants on their uniforms and equipment too, (Germans also) and encouraged them in their efforts to preserve military history. One young fellow in particular caught my eye and brought back memories for me. He was dressed in WWII Navy Blues. He informed me his grandfather had been in the Navy in WWII. I learned he was in the Penna. National Guard and had returned from Iraq. with a bronze star. There were a number of young

ladies walking around dressed in the early 1940s style.

By the time you read this newsletter Abraham Lincoln's birthday (Feb 12th) will be passed. George Washington's birthday is on Feb 22nd. Now of course, you can celebrate both of their birthdays of Feb 18th (Presidents Day) thanks to the government and tourist industry, just like . . . Memorial Day week end.

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Back in Time with Hartranft



Above is displayed a tattered, 1899, 1-3/8" *souvenir medal*, commemorating the unveiling of a statue of Civil War hero General J. F. Hartranft in Harrisburg, PA 1899. Unveiled May 12, 1899, an impressive equestrian statue stood near the Pennsylvania Capitol Building in Harrisburg honoring Hartranft the former Civil War Hero.

Susquehanna Valley

Our valley lost an irreplaceable remnant of our Civil War history last week, and most people do not even know it.

John Peter Shindel Gobin was a young Sunbury attorney who, in the summer of 1861, led a company of volunteers from the Susquehanna Valley to Harrisburg to join the Union war effort. The unit was officially designated as Company C, 47th Pennsylvania Volunteers, and Gobin served as its captain.

Captain Gobin served throughout the war, rising through the ranks to eventually command the entire regiment. Upon Gobin's promotion to major, one of his soldiers wrote, "This appointment is well deserved and is the unanimous choice of the regiment. The members of Company C, for their own good, are opposed to losing their captain, but for his advancement are well pleased, and consider what is their loss is gain to the regiment."

Gobin received a brevet, or temporary, promotion to brigadier general just prior to the end of the war. Following the war, Gobin retained the high esteem of his fellow veterans. He served as Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, the largest veterans' organization of its day. He served as Grand Master of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar in North America from 1889 to 1892. Gobin also served in the Pennsylvania State Senate, and was Lieutenant Governor of Pennsylvania from 1899 until 1903.

Gobin kept much of his wartime correspondence and newspaper clippings about his postwar achievements in scrapbooks. A few days ago, an individual in Rochester, New York put the scrapbooks up for sale on Ebay, apparently having acquired the books from someone in Gobin's family. The asking price was nearly \$17,000.

I contacted the seller immediately, explaining Gobin's Sunbury connection and expressing the hope that a way could be found to bring the general's papers home to our valley. I contacted the Northumberland County Historical Society, whose director, Cindy Inkrote, instantly recognized the value of the material, but who expressed sincere regret that the Society could not offer much assistance – the asking price far exceeded the group's total acquisition budget.

By the time I suggested to The Daily Item that we do a quick story to alert any potential benefactors in the valley, it was too late. Someone was willing to pay the seller's asking price, and the auction was over. When I asked the seller if he would be willing to make copies of the material, he agreed – if I paid him \$1,250, and quickly, since, according to the seller, the scrapbooks were to be mailed to the buyer the next day. Such an exorbitant sum far exceeded my own budget for duplicating, and it seemed to me rather exploitative for the seller to engage in such a "high pressure" tactic, knowing of my passionate interest in the material.

Last week, John Peter Shindel Gobin's letters and clippings disappeared into someone's private collection, perhaps never to be seen again. The person who bought the material might well choose to clip the general's signatures from the letters and sell them piecemeal to autograph dealers or collectors, thereby destroying the integrity of the documents forever. As a company commander, Gobin always took good care of his men. The surviving letters from soldiers in Company C speak of his integrity and thoughtfulness. When the company's drummer boy, John Boulton Young, died, Gobin made sure the body was eventually returned to his parents in Sunbury. When the men decided to pool their meager funds in order to buy better food, they trusted Gobin to serve as company treasurer.

Gobin's legacy of honorable service to our commonwealth and our country is now all we have left to cherish.—shared by John Deppen, Svc.

Norm Houser, Gene Mascioli, Kelly Betz, David J. Klinepeter, joined with Larry C. Sheibley, Donnie Prye and son, and Floyd and David Demmy too. Also, Jim Brenner, the educational director at the National Civil War Museum was on site! A Philadelphia area history teacher interviewed Veteran Floyd Demmy. Later Floyd obtained an overseas cap to top off his World War II 'Ike' uniform. We toured the vendor buildings and barracks of, not only the Allied troops, but the barracks housing the German reenactors too. Of course, these barracks are the original World War II wooden barracks built in the 1930's and widely used by several Division's that trained at the GAP prior to D-Day. This author's Division, the 3d Armored Division, indicated in their history book, that the GAP was the best site they were assigned to during the era of WWII. The scenic valley and weather were ideal for the terrain and conditions they would experience in Germany in due time.

While this event was not a sanctioned Camp 15 field trip, the 8 of us had a marvelous time in the fresh air of 19,000 acres of this military installation. When printed, additional Photos to be posted to our website.
