

General John F. Hartranft Camp #15 of the capital city of Harrisburg published its camp history in February, 2008. The <u>History of Camp #15: 1882-2008</u>, One <u>Hundred Twenty-Five Years of Fraternity</u>, Charity, and Loyalty contains fifty-two pages of photographs, stories, and names.

The past year was a record year for increased membership with thirteen new brothers joining the local SUVCW camp. Welcome!

Camp #15 Brother Charles E. Kuhn, Jr., ended his term as Commander-in-Chief and Camp #15 Brother Lee F. Walters finished his term as Pennsylvania Department Commander and retired as National SUVCW Executive Director. In this latter position, he was replaced by Camp #15 Brother David W. Demmy, Sr.

On Memorial week-end, Camp Commander Gregory Kline, Senior Vice-Commander John Deppen, Brother Ronald Shireman and his wife Helen (great, great granddaughter of General John F. Hartranft) attended a wreath laying ceremony at the General's grave in Montgomery Cemetery in Norristown, PA.

Camp officers continue in their second year term; and, the camp continues to sell SUVCW brass belt buckles for \$30 and colorful SUVCW aluminum license plates for \$15.

With the absence of the Commander and SVC, Junior Vice-Commander Zellers called the meeting to order at 1410 hours. The Hartranft Camp #15 treasury contains \$2180 as reported by Treasurer Demmy, Sr. Keep in mind a large percentage of these funds are *collected dues* which will be remitted to the Pennsylvania Department of the SUVCW in short order.

Secretary Sheibley reminded members of the Civil War Lincoln Luncheon in Philadelphia on 7 February 2009. Attendance forms were available.

Health conditions for Brother Don Fry and Sister Mary Smith were noted and get-well cards were sent to both.

The Camp Council is considering petitions for changes in the camp by-laws and the camp dues.

Patriotic Instructor Klinepeter drew four tickets for prizes which were won by Brothers Demmy, Jr.; Frank Haley; Floyd Demmy; and Tom Bruner. He showed photos of himself presenting license plates to the new Department Commander, the new Commander-in-Chief, and the past Commander-in-Chief.

This year is the start of the Lincoln Bicentennial, the 145th Anniversary of the Gettysburg Address, and the 50th Anniversary of the Harrisburg Civil War Roundtable. He mentioned some activities involved with each of these celebrations. Four new Lincoln pennies and a silver dollar will be appearing this year. Brother Dave read a list of new Lincoln books.

Finally, he read a book review that appeared in the January <u>Civil War News</u>. Written by Brother Deppen, the negative review discussed the book, <u>Lincoln Unmasked – What You Are Not Supposed to Know about Dishonest Abe</u> by Thomas J. DiLorenzo.

In other business, the camp learned that Brother Haley has dropped his position of Camp Guide and his membership on the Camp Council. Brother Thomas Bruner volunteered to be guide and Brother Norman Houser will be a Camp Council member.

J.V. Commander Zellers closed the meeting at 1503 hours.

Twenty-eight members were sent dues notifications for non-payment as of mid-January.

Next meeting, Camp #15 will be voting on candidate Logan Garth Swanger of 239 Spruce Street, Middletown, PA 17057.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/ GAR HISTORIAN

February 12th was the 200th anniversary of ABRAHAM LINCOLN'S birthday.

Somewhere I read there have been over 50,000 books written on Lincoln, and that is before his 200th birthday.

There are many up coming affairs dealing on the Lincoln. There are books, lectures, tours, balls etc. One such Ball took place in Washington D.C. in Jan 2009. It was in honor of Lincoln's second Inaugural in 1865. The location was at the American Art Museum in the Smithsonian complex. The entertainment was furnished by the Victorian Dance Ensemble with Dance Master Larry Keener-Farley leading. (He is a PCC in Hartranft Camp 15 SUVCW) Your Patriotic Instructor also participated in the dancing. What really made it so special for us, we were dancing in the same building were the original was held. I could feel the spirits of the past there, felling they were encouraging us to keep the memories of the past alive. To learn more information about Abraham Lincoln go to the internet and type in his name.

<u>Did you know</u> Lincoln was an inventor? His patent #6469, was granted on May 22, 1849, for a device for "Buoying Vessels Over Shoals", (I will have a handout on this at the Feb meeting).

A FEW EARLY LINCOLN QUOTES

"As a nation we began by declaring that all men are created equal. We now practically read it, all men are created equal except Negroes. (1855)

A house divided against it self cannot stand. I believe this government cannot endure permanently, half slave and half free. I do not expect the Union to be dissolved--I do not expect the house to fall---but I do expect it will cease to be divided. (Lincoln Douglas debate June 1858)

This is essentially a People's contest. On the side of the Union, it is a struggle for maintaining in the world. That form, and substance of government, whose leading object is, to elevate the condition of men---to lift artificial weights from all shoulders---to clear the paths of laudable pursuit for all---to afford all, an unfettered start, and a fair chance, in the race of life. (July 4th 1861)

I expect to maintain this contest until successful, or till I die, or am conquered, or my term expires, or Congress or country forsakes me. June 1862

Thank God I have lived to see this. It seems to me that I have been dreaming a horrid dream for four years, and now the nightmare is gone. April 3rd 1865".


On April 14th Abraham Lincoln was shot and on April 15th, 1865 he died. DJK

Whitlock's grave marker during Saturday's rededication ceremony at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Merritt Island. Natowich, a relative of the Confederate Army applicant, a Government headstone or marker for the unmarked grave of any eligible veteran in any cemetery around the world. Note: There is no charge for the headstone or marker itself, however arrangements for placing it in a private cemetery are the applicant's responsibility and all setting fees are at private expense. There is no change in eligibility for veterans in unmarked graves: Regardless of the date of death, VA will furnish, at no charge to the veteran, was doing research on her family's history when she discovered the original maker had been vandalized

Gettysburg, PA, January 29, 2009: The national Abraham Lincoln "birthday card" initiative, conceived by Lincoln artist Wendy Allen, has been announced. Endorsed and facilitated by the national Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission, and hosted in Pennsylvania by the PA Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission, Allen's project will begin February 2nd – 7th in the Main Rotunda of the State Capitol Building in Harrisburg PA.

Ms. Allen will be on-site 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. each day creating a unique portrait of Lincoln and helping visitors sign the accompanying birthday card panels. This event is free and open to the general public.

The card will remain in the Rotunda at the Capitol through February 11th when it will travel to Gettysburg, PA. The card will be in residence at the Historic Gettysburg Railroad Station, 35 Carlisle Street, February 12-16th and available to the public during regular hours

CONFEDERATE HOLIDAY

. Wednesday, February 04, 2009 HERE'S THE LATEST: A black state senator is pushing a bill that would require South Carolina cities and counties to give their workers a paid day off for Confederate Memorial Day or lose millions in state funds. Democratic Sen. Robert Ford's bill won initial approval from a Senate subcommittee Tuesday. It would force county and municipal governments to follow the schedule of holidays used by the state, which gives workers 12 paid days off, including May 10 to honor Confederate war dead, Mississippi and Alabama also recognize Confederate Memorial Day. BACKGROUND: Years ago, Ford said, he pushed a bill to make both that day and Martin Luther King Jr. Day paid holidays. He considered it an effort to help people understand the history of both the civil rights movement and the Confederacy in a state where the Orders of Secession are engraved in marble in the Statehouse lobby, portraits of Confederate generals look down on legislators in their chambers and the Confederate flag flies outside
