# PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/GAR HISTORIAN

In the November 2016 issue of the newsletter I showed the original orders appointing Louis Wagner temporary commander of the Department of Pennsylvania for the GAR. In the December 2016 issue of the newsletter was a list of the National Encampments starting in November 20, 1866 at Indianapolis, IN and ending at Indianapolis, In September 1, 1949. In this issue of the newsletter is a list of the Department of Pennsylvania Encampments, dating from January 16, 1867 to June 23, 1938. Note that in the early years they held two Encampments each year till June 1896. In June they went to one Encampment that was held in June. In the early semi-annual meeting the "Boys in Blue" went to Gettysburg many times. Harrisburg hosted the Department Encampments numerous times over the years.





# Speaker at March Camp Meeting

Our speaker for March 19, 2017 Camp 15 meeting is Dick Simpson. Dick and his wife Deborah, spend their summers on Willoughby Lake in Westmore, Vermont. Dick's family has lived in the area for six generations. He is the Historian for the Town of Westmore where he lectures on local history. From November to April they live in Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

Dick has been touring Civil War battlefields since Junior High School, mostly following the 3rd and 15th Vermont Regiments in which his relatives fought and died. He has six Civil War slide programs that he gives throughout the Northeast. With over 150 lectures, he has raised over \$10,000 dollars for battlefield preservation through donations and his Civil War book raffles.



Brother Dick is also a civilian Civil War reenactor portraying Frederick Holbrook, the Civil War governor of Vermont.

He is an active member of dozens of Civil War organizations in Vermont, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania, including the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Gen.

Geo H Thomas Camp 19, Lancaster. Dick's discuss in **March** with us will be about:

"The Forgotten Battle of Franklin Tennessee"

The battle of Franklin Tennessee began on November 30, 1864 when a 20,000 strong Confederate force under General John Bell Hood cornered the Federal Army of General John Schofield at Franklin, Tennessee. Late that afternoon, 100 regiments of the South's best soldiers, numbering 20,000 men, began a spectacular assault along a two-mile front. What occurred in the next five hours was one of the great tragedies of the American Civil War. There were more Confederate soldiers advancing that day than in Pickett's charge at Gettysburg and there were more Confederate losses than at almost every oneday battle of the Civil War. Before it was over a record six Confederate generals would lose their lives.

Yet there is no National Cemetery and no National Battlefield Park at Franklin. Instead, almost all of the 1864 trench line of that battle has become suburban neighborhoods and small businesses. Great strides have been made to save parts of this battlefield since Dick began this lecture in 2003. Slides of what Franklin looks like today will be part of this program.

### BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In January 1862 Fredrick Douglass visited Governor Andrew Curtin at the capital in Harrisburg, Pa. His intent was to have the Governor to organize colored troops to fight in the Civil War. Governor Curtin refused, one reason, the Federal Government was not accepting them. In January 1863, after much pleading with Secretary of War Stanton, Massachusetts Governor Andrews received permission to organize a Black Volunteer Regiment, with white officers. In Harrisburg, Pa.

Thomas Morris Chester was instrumental in recruiting men from central Pa. area. In June 1863 over 135 recruits went to Massachusetts to join the 55th Mass Regiment of colored troops. It is mentioned that the Chester family paid the train fare for the men from Pa.

The same month Governor Curtin received permission to organize colored troops in Pa. In September 1863 Camp Penn was opened near Philadelphia, Pa. Over 8,600 colored troops from Pa and 189, 00 nationally served in the Army from 1863 to 1865. Many also served in the Navy. Eighteen distinguished themselves and were awarded the Medal of Honor. Following the War of the Rebellion, many joined the Grand Army of the Republic.

Harrisburg, Pa. had David Stevens GAR Post 520. For those interested there is much material to be researched.

Dates to remember

Late February 1864 Andersonville Prison was first opened.

March 3, 1863 the first U S Draft was signed into law for men from ages 18 to 45. djk ....



A venerable moment indeed as Charlie would have said, displaying the V for Victory sign in his image above! Image above is reprint from our September 2007, Camp newsletter, the *Hartranft Herald*, Vol 9, No. 9., Cover page.

Strange not one reader in '07 mentioned all 3 Brothers above are sporting civil war beards!

In the heyday of sailing ships, all war ships and many freighters carried iron cannons. Those cannons fired round iron cannon balls. It was necessary to keep a good supply near the cannon. However, how to prevent them from rolling about the deck? The best storage method devised was a square-based pyramid with one ball on top, resting on four resting on nine, which rested on sixteen. Thus, a supply of 30 cannon balls could be stacked in a small area right next to the cannon. There was only one problem....how to prevent the bottom layer from sliding or rolling from under the others. The solution was a metal plate called a 'Monkey' with 16 round indentations. However, if this plate were made of iron, the iron balls would quickly rust to it. The solution to the rusting problem was to make 'Brass Monkeys.' Few landlubbers realize that brass contracts much more and much faster than iron when chilled. *Consequently, when the temperature dropped too far, the brass indentations would shrink so much that the iron cannonballs would come right off the monkey*, it was quite literally, 'Cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey.' (All this time, you thought that was an improper expression, didn't you.)

### **Pennsylvania Department Project**

The Local Host Committee of the 2017 Pennsylvania Department Encampment is seeking your assistance. In the tradition of the Grand Army of the Republic, the committee is seeking donations of items to be presented on behalf of the Pennsylvania Department Encampment to the Veterans at the Butler County Area VA Hospital. These donations are not to be confused with the annual charitable donations presented by the Allied Orders at the Campfire. Today's Veterans Health Administration (VHA) originated during the Civil War as the first federal hospitals ever established for the nation's volunteer forces. On March 3, 1865, a month before the Civil War ended. President Abraham Lincoln authorized the first-ever national soldiers' and sailors' asylum to provide medical and convalescent care for discharged members of the Union Army and Navy volunteer forces. The national homes were often called "soldiers' homes" or "military homes." Initially only soldiers and sailors who served with the Union forces —including U.S. Colored Troops were eligible for admittance.VA Butler Healthcare is located in the heart of Butler County and convenient to community support services for Western Pennsylvania and Eastern Ohio-area Veterans. They have been attending to Veterans' total care since 1947 and are the health care choice for over 18,000 Veterans. Just as American citizens have for centuries supported our sick, wounded veterans; the Pennsylvania Department of the Allied Orders of the Grand Army of the Republic is once again taking the lead in organizing a grass roots effort among our membership to help our nation's heroes. All Camps, Auxiliaries, Tents, Circles and Corps are encouraged to ask their members to participate by collecting the donations from their area. It is our hope that the items can then be transported to the Department Encampment by an attendee. This would be a wonderful opportunity for those not able to the encampment, to participate in the event. We wish to convey that these are to be individual donations and not made by the Camps, Auxiliaries, Tents, Circles and Corps themselves. The Camps, Auxiliaries, Tents, Circles and Corps may coordinate the donations offered by their members. To better meet the needs of these Veterans, below is a list of approved items that may be donated. Only those items noted below and/or items approved by the VA will be accepted.

### DONATED ITEMS:

COMFORT ITEMS: body wash, chap-stick, lotion, body spray, deodorant, denture adhesive/paste and cleaner, shampoo, conditioner, mouthwash (alcohol free), shaving cream/gel, double edge razors or high quality razors, nail files, nail clippers, blankets, laundry detergent (regular and hypoallergenic), fabric softener (liquid and dryer sheets), nail polish and nail polish remover, cotton balls and q-tips, aftershave (alcohol free), nail sticks, feminine hygiene products.
