#### PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/ GAR HISTORIAN

For Christmas, I received, from my niece, a small book entitled "Pennsylvania Civil War Trails", a guide to Battle sites Monuments, Museums and Towns. It talks about seven itineraries that will help people discover the Civil War history of south central Pennsylvania. Down country roads through small towns, the armies moved. Some areas have hardly changes, while others have surrendered to the modern world, strip malls, gas stations, cars, parking lots, and highways. Even I learned small interesting facts about our area during the war. I recommend it.

Not every one spent Christmas celebrating, even in 1860. Harper's Weekly, Saturday January 5, 1861 the country is thrown into a state of great excitement by the intelligence that, on Christmas night, the gallant Major Anderson, commanding the United States force at Fort Moultrie, abandoned that fort, and removed his command to Fort Sumter. The guns at Fort Moultrie have been spiked, the gun carriages burned. The movement reflects the greatest credit on, the judgment of Major Anderson, who it seems, acted exclusively on his own responsibility in, the matter, and without consultation with the Government or with General Scott. Note--South Carolina had already left the Union.

From the mid-point of the giant compass on the spectacular rotunda floor, take ten paces south to the base of the grand staircase. Ascend to the peak with twenty-six careful steps, or take a quick ride in our beautifully paneled elevator, then turn again due south and follow the brass rail to the double wooden doors. Give the sentry the secret password and enter a world seldom seen... you have begun a *Journey to the Centre of the Museum*.

Your first stop will be the archives, which feature letters and diaries written by soldiers of the North and South, in camp and in the field, letters stained with homesick tears and smudged with dirt from the trenches. You will see battle maps, newspapers, Commissions signed by presidents and wartime governors and crystal clear photographs that will give you a close up look at the reality of war. Many of the thousands of documents are never see the light of day, but they will be seen by you.

Next, travel deep within the Museum walls to a place where only a select few are allowed to venture. Your journey will take you to the Collections Storage Room, where we keep, and care for the vast collection not currently on display in our galleries. You will see muskets, pistols, uniforms, drums, portraits, and artifacts too numerous to mention. We promise you will be amazed and inspired!

Your Journey Guide is our Collections Curator, Brett Kelley, who loves enthusiastic visitors, so bring lots of questions! *Journey to the Centre of the Museum* is for members only and requires advanced registration. #### **Brothers and Sisters in Distress**

For a while, Commander-in-Chief Dave Medert's wife has been ill off and on. Also, Past CinC Bud Atkinson of the Phila area has undergone surgery.

Update on Mrs. Dianna Medert: She had her MRI on Monday and we visited the oncologist today. The MRI reveals that "at present" there is no tumor and "at present", he did not see any tumor cells. He will be putting her on a maintenance treatment which will be Temodor, 5 days on 23 days off for 18 months and MRI conducted every two months. Treatment will commence in approximately 3 months.

Her oncologist wants to chat with the surgeon that conducted her bowel surgery. He had stated that after 6 months free of steroids and chemo, he would be able to reconnect the bowel. The oncologist doesn't want to wait 6 months to start maintenance treatments so he is going to discuss different options with her surgeon and then let us know.

The last three days have been super for Dianna. She has made remarkable progress and recovery from the treatments and her surgery. She still wants assistance with the colostomy, which is no problem. She is more alert and staying awake longer, however, she is still weak. She has been making phone calls to family and will continue to do so as she feels up to it.

It must be the week for good news, Bud had a successful replacement of his Aortic Valve, and is recovering at a more rapid pace than the surgeon expected. As of today, Wednesday, he is still in ICU and in considerable pain, and just shakes his head when the doctors tell him how well he is doing. When discharged we will go to my daughter's home for a few days as her home is all on one floor. I will check the email from her home.

An update on Bud follows: Latest news on Bud Atkinson is that the surgery was successful and the surgeon expects Bud to make a full recovery. The doctors confirmed that Bud does have emphysema that

will require treatment after he is recovered. A scan on Friday detected the beginning of pneumonia and Bud has also contracted C-Dif, and intestinal infection, so his release from the hospital will be delayed.

Much more serious news has come to my attention regarding Past Auxiliary Department President Mary R. Smith. Mary was admitted to the hospital for treatment of an aneurysm in her right leg. For some reason the treatment for the aneurysm started throwing off blot clots into Mary's blood stream and one of these clots lodged in her foot. The doctors felt that amputation was needed to save Mary's life and she agreed with them. Yesterday morning Mary's right leg was amputated above the knee. Only further information I have as of this morning is that Mary came through the operation and is in the CCU. As soon as I get further information I will pass it on.

Obviously, Mary is still in very serious condition and I ask all Brothers of the Pennsylvania Department to keep Mary and her family in your prayers. Mary's hospital address is as follows:
