



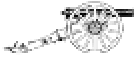

If you normally cannot attend a general business meeting of Camp 15, now is the time for you to come out and join with us at our annual picnic, break bread, and fellowship with us in an informal setting! If the heat gets to anyone of us, or if it rains on the officers today, there is a fine air-conditioned church building next door to the picnic pavilion. As needed, following the meal, there may be a quick business discussion.

Later, upon request, a tour of the church will be conducted for any one interested in that subject.

**Picnic to be held on Sunday, July 19 from noon til around 4-5 pm.** Look for **American Flag** along Valley Road in Colonial Park, Lower Paxton Township.

We'll begin meal at about 1 pm. Your Camp will provide cooks, hamburgers, [tube steaks] and condiments, heavy duty plastic ware etc. **Please bring a dish or drinks, chips, salads, and/or desserts to share!** Please bring your own table coverings and/or place settings! The *Hartranft Herald* will not only recycle your used soda cans, but will dispose of trash and burnt offerings after the gathering at CrossPoint United Methodist Church, 430 Colonial Road, Colonial Park, Lower Paxton Township – use Valley Road entrance to pavilion area. You may use the north side main entrance at Colonial Road turn onto Crums Mill Road and drive around the church facility to the pavilion on the southern side of the campus or use the southern entrance along Valley Road.

Valley Road is easily accessible from Progress Avenue in Susquehanna Township and Colonial Road in Lower Paxton Township. Valley Road runs east and west like Jonestown Road Route 22, and Linglestown Road Route 33.

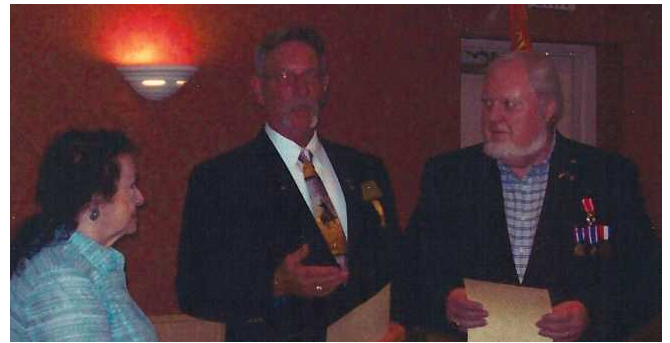

#### [PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/GAR HISTORIAN](#)

Another July "Battle of Gettysburg and 4th of July have come and gone. This year was considered as an off year so there were about 1500 troops involved. Last year was the 145th, so there were over 12,000 troops. The next large battle will be the 150th year (provided they can find a farm large enough to hold it on.) I was there Friday and Saturday portraying Governor Curtin one day and a Sheriff the other. There was a good crowd attending both days. Sunday the fifth was their biggest day "Pickett's Charge". At least this stimulates people's interest in the Civil War, seeing as the schools do not teach too much on the subject any more. I was glad to see the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War had a table of material set up in the artist tent. This is something we need to do more often at other events. Over the years the Sons of the Confederate Veterans have had a tent display at many of the reenactments.

I did manage to visit downtown Gettysburg for a while. Took in a number of shops and came away shaking my head! There must be a million T SHIRTS, thousands of mugs, cups knickknacks (JUNK) guess where the stuff is made. A few places had interesting items. As expected there were many American flags on display on the streets and also to buy, I saw very few flags in Harrisburg and surrounding areas. Some towns had 4th of July parades.

DID YOU KNOW?

After the Battle of Gettysburg the combined casualty total of dead, wounded, and missing for the two armies was set at 51,112

Gettysburg was costly to General Officers, according to some reports 32 were casualties. 16 Union and 16 Confederate of those 8 on each side died of mortal wounds inflicted at Gettysburg.

The First Minnesota suffered the highest casualties at Gettysburg, 82 percent

The Second Wisconsin also suffered 77 percent casualties

General John Reynolds was the highest ranking officer killed at Gettysburg

General Winfield Hancock badly wounded at Gettysburg, later ran for President against James Garfield. DJK

Dear Sir: I'm seeking the opportunity to contact descendants of soldiers who served in **Union regiments manning the Petersburg line during the successful Federal Sixth Corps assault on April 2, 1865.**

The Breakthrough Battle took place on ground that is today substantially within Pamplin Historical Park, near P Petersburg, Virginia.

My website ( <http://www.petersburgbreakthrough.org> ) is a collection of descendant's association WebPages that feature regimental histories, notes on soldiers, and descendant's roll calls that list soldiers and descendants or family members. These web pages are intended to honor the patriots of both sides who served in this climatic and generally under-appreciated battle. Call: <http://www.petersburgbreakthrough.org/121stNYroll.htm> I happen to descend from a soldier in the 6th Maryland Infantry, so this site is much more developed and a good model for what each regimental Descendants Association can become over time.

<http://www.6thmarylandinfantry.org/> The battle became a matter of great interest to me when I was researching and writing "Two Brothers: One North, One South." The novel tells the story of the Prentiss brothers of Baltimore and is very closely based on real people and events. Clifton Prentiss served in the US 6th Maryland Infantry and William Prentiss served in the 1st and 2nd CS Maryland Battalions. They actually met as the battle raged on the battlefield on April 2, 1865 and are buried side by side at Green-Wood Cemetery in Brooklyn, New York. Walt Whitman wrote about William Prentiss in "Memoranda during the War." Other important characters include Hetty, Jenny, and Constance Cary, the reigning belles of wartime Richmond. Given its authenticity, the novel is available from the Gettysburg National Military Park Visitor Center & Museum bookstore, the Museum of the Confederacy bookstore, and the Pamplin Historical Park & National Museum of the Civil War Soldier bookstore. Please circulate among your membership the list shown below of the regiments, battalions, and batteries that served in the final battles of the Petersburg Campaign. If any of your members are descendants or family members of soldiers who served in these units at any time during the war, please ask them to contract me for inclusion on the Descendants Roll Call. There is no charge or obligation for the listing. Thank you.

In the upper right hand corner of the Flickr (Yahoo photos) page there is a search box. You can type "Confederate" or "Union" to get Confederate soldiers or Union soldiers. To get Civil war Veterans who I have a biography or obituary on, you type "Biography" or "Obituary".
