Commander Prye called the SUVCW Camp 15 meeting to order at 2:05 pm. As reported by Treasurer David Demmy, the camp treasury contains \$2600 with several outstanding bills to be paid.

Chaplain Demmy gave health up-dates on two members. Both Arthur Longnaker and Frank Haley are improving quite well.

Some members will be representing Camp 15 in the Gettysburg Memorial Day parade. Patriotic Instructor Dave Klinepeter explained the difference between the Memorial Day and the Remembrance Day celebrations. The former was organized to honor the Civil War dead and the latter was established to honor the date of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. This second celebration is held the Saturday closest to November 19.

Included with the sale of each of the seven reproduction 45.70 rifles will be a cover-case, booklet, video, and 100 rounds of ammunition. The rifles will be sold to members for at original Camp price. Members have until June 30 to contact Commander Prye if interested in a rifle; after July 1, they go on sell to the general public.

The field trip to the Norristown Cemetery and the Montgomery County Historical Society scheduled for Saturday, June 9, was discussed.

An error was noted in the latest edition of <u>The Banner</u>. An incorrect address and price were given for the brass belt buckles which we are selling. They cost \$30 and can be ordered from the secretary who will contact the magazine staff about the mistake. One of our buckles sold for \$52 on E-bay. The camp will try to get involved with this method of sales.

Floyd Demmy said that the Assembly of God Church on North Progress Avenue (Harrisburg) is looking for speakers. Pastor Lamer may contact Camp 15 to make a presentation (to the A. G. congregation about the Sons).

Decorating the Harrisburg Cemetery for Memorial Day was discussed –breakfast at 7:00 and decorating at 9:00.

Patriotic Instructor Klinepeter donated money for advertisement space in the 2007 PA Department Encampment booklet. He spoke of past Harrisburg Memorial Day parades and read from the 1904, 38th GAR Encampment in Gettysburg.

From SUVCW PA Department Chaplain Dave Acheson, Camp 15 received a sympathy card for the death of Brother Harry Runkle.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/GAR HISTORIAN

Memorial Day has come and gone again. Some area communities still have parades and services in remembrance of all Veterans. Harrisburg has an Artfest. Camp 15 had a number of members help put flags out at the Harrisburg, Pa cemetery. The members of American Legion Post 27 have taken care of cemetery for many years while Camp 15 was inactive. I do admire the one Veteran of World War 2

who has been placing flags there for over 50 years. Years ago the cemeteries had metal grave markers for the various wars. Some cemeteries have removed the markers for their convenience (rotary mowers). This makes it harder to find the Veteran graves. Many gravestones did not contain a Veterans unit number. Weeks after Memorial Day I drove through the Paxtang cemetery they still have the metal grave markers for all wars.

- Future planning Sesquicentennial of the American Civil War (2011-2015)

The approaching Sesquicentennial of the Civil War offers the current generation of Americans a most important opportunity to know, discuss, and commemorate this country's greatest national crisis, while at the same time exploring its enduring relevance in the 21st century.

In preparation for the Sesquicentennial, the National Park Service-through the collective effort of the superintendents at Civil War-related parks-proposes to undertake a multi-faceted, multi-year integrated program that will simultaneously transform and improve interpretation of the Civil War in our national parks while providing a national forum for the observance of the Sesquicentennial of America's greatest national crisis.

During the preparatory period ((2005-2011), the web site below will present information on the events leading up to the Civil War, so that the Sesquicentennial can be experienced as the 150th anniversary of major military events, but also of social, political, economic and cultural transformations that have changed the nation forever. Note from Brother Russ down in South Carolina - While at a re-enactment last weekend, I saw a reproduction flag that read "6th Regt. P.V.V." I thought to myself, "Shouldn't that be P.V.I. for Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry?" Just a while ago,

I visited http://www.pacivilwar.com/cwpaflags.html and saw the same thing written on the flag of the 79th Pennsylvania.

Could P.V.V. stand for Pennsylvania Volunteer Volunteers or is it something else entirely? This just struck me as strange and I was hoping you might know more about it than I do.

By the way, the Battle we re-enacted Sunday was the Battle of Griswoldville which has special interest to me because my great great uncle Isaiah T. Enders took part in it while serving in the 9th PA Cavalry. Yours in F., C., and L, Russ Ottens.

The *Hartranft Herald* didn't know the answer to Russ' query, so the staff contacted the Pennsylvania State Commander's office and received a prompt reply:

P.V.V. represents Pennsylvania Veteran Volunteers (the Invalid Corps). And The Medical Corps designations was M.S. The P.V.M was the Pennsylvania Vol. Militia. The Hartranft Herald is grateful to Brother Commander Lee Walters for filling in the gap and thanx for writing Bro Russ.

On the eve of the anniversary of the U. S. Army, brother Donald writes, "Just a piece of information for you -- my great grandfather 5 times removed, William Butler, served with the Continental Army from April 1776 until the end of the Revolutionary War. He fought in nearly every major battle of the war, including crossing the Delaware with Washington. He with 3 other men captured a Hessian Fort, and 180 plus Hessian soldiers, that after his Lt, and 16 other men were either killed or wounded seriously. William was a Sgt, and the second in command, but had to take command after the Lt. was killed. William was wounded twice in the war, once during the capture of the fort. It was due to men like him that we have such a great tradition in our Army. I have a book of his exploits if you are interested to read! Your Brother in Arms, Donald Butler back home in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.



It's 1950 and Camp 15 attends the 70th Pennsylvania Department Encampment held in Harrisburg. Stats:

72 camps across the Commonwealth; 2400 members; loss 200 during 1949-1950.

DC is Gilbert Brown; the Commander-in-Chief is John Runkle, (Mr. SUVCW from Camp 15).

Per Capita – National \$.48; Pennsylvania \$.72. Total Budget \$2800.

Commander-in-Chief John Runkle of Camp 15, indicated that air travel during his tenure made his travels across the USA much easier than by car.

Biggest Compliant at encampment – Camp secretaries not submitting membership changes-of-address to Department; therefore, many members are not receiving their BANNER(s). (SOUND FAMILIAR BROTHERS!)

The encampment resolution #12 resolved a heartily thanks upon Camp 15, the Home Camp, the city of Harrisburg, Chamber of Commerce, Press, and WHP Radio and VFW Post 710 for a joyous and successful encampment in Harrisburg for the third time in as many decades!



ILLINOIS. The department was organized July 12, 1866. A brief report in 1869 gave the number of posts as 330. There is no record of another department session until 1872; the year previous, but one post, at Rockford, was alive; in 1872 a per capita tax was paid upon but 246 members, increased in 1874 to 682; four years later the number was but 805.

ber was but 805.

INDIANA. The first post was organized at South Bend in the summer of 1866; the department was constituted August 20, at which time the post at Indianapolis had nearly a thousand members; a few months later 300 posts were reported, every one, with a single exception, disappearing before 1870; the post at South Bend maintained its organization, and for a time after the dissolution of the Indiana department reported to Iowa. The department was reorganized October 3, 1879, the membership being then reported as 880

membership being then reported as 889.

Iowa. The first post was instituted at Davenport, July 12, 1866, and a department September 26; the following year 95 posts were reported; in 1870 the membership had been reduced to less than 500, and the following year the department was dissolved; only one post, that first instituted at Davenport, kept up its organization, with a membership at no time for a number of years reaching 100. The department was reorganized July 23, 1879, and at the close of the following year there were but 530 members in the state.

year there were but 530 members in the state.
Wisconsin. During the summer of 1866 a
number of soldier associations were reorganized
as posts of the Grand Army, and Post 4 of Berlin,
instituted in September, is now the oldest with an
unbroken existence in the order. The department was organized June 7, 1866, and although
the number of posts was for several years reduced
to three or four, 321 being the largest membership
reported from 1871 to 1880, the form of a department organization was kept up.

OHIO. Posts were organized in the autumn of 1866, no records being in existence to show exact

dates; the department was constituted January 30, 1867; at the close of the following year 303 posts were reported; two years later the membership was reduced to 917, falling still further to 365, represented in eight posts in 1875, and reaching

only 675 at the close of 1878; the organization of the department was kept up, however, and reports

made throughout,

MINNESOTA. The date of organization of first posts is not known; members were initiated early in August, 1866, and seven posts were in existence August 16, when the department was constituted.

information as to the posts, and in little more than two years the department organization was lost to sight; in 1871 there was reported a membership of 179; no reports for the three succeeding years; in 1875 the number was given as 37; three years again with no reports; and 245 given as the total number for 1879. A provisional department was

constituted November 19, 1875, and a permanent department January 22,

1879. MISSOURI. But meagre records are to be had of the early days. Posts were organized in the latter part of 1866, and a department consti-tuted May 7, 1867; the order grew rapidly and had a large membership; but a simoon seemed to strike it, and the reports ceased for eight years after 1871, when but 100 members were re-ported; in 1882 the membership was given as 129. A new department was cre-

ated April 22, 1882. Louisiana. There were ten posts in 1867, and a department was organized July 7; the latter disappeared altogether within two years; about 40 members remained in good standing through the years until 1881, when the number increased to 73 and two years later to 179; a new post was organized in April, 1872, and a department constituted in


May, 1884.

KENTUCKY. A

provisional department was organized in January, 1867. There is very little of record in existence to show the growth of the order, 124 members being reported in 1871, reduced to 68 in 1874; then comes a blank in the history, the department going out of existence.

In 1882 a provisional department was organized, and at the close of the year 414 members were reported; a permanent department was constituted

July 16, 1883. WEST VIRGINIA. West Virginia. A provisional department was organized April 9, 1868; during that year the reports show the existence of 17 posts; the department lived only three years, and there were then no reports until 1880, when the organization of new posts was begun; the membership was then

The latter ceased to exist in 1879, only one post,

The latter ceased to exist in 1879, only one post, at Stillwater, being alive; a year later new posts were organized, and on August 17 a new department was constituted.

Kansas. The first posts were organized in November, 1866, by transfer of members of other soldier organizations; the department was constituted December 7; the latter had an existence of little more than two years, and while a few posts kept up a struggling sort of life, the reported membership was but 136 in 1876, and 232 in 1880. A new department was organized March 16 of the latter year. latter year.

Michigan. A provisional department was organized October 1, 1867; the records furnish no

Soldiers were deep in the **Battle of the Bulge**, which took place 60 years ago in Belgium's winter weather.

That's when paratrooper Louis Zotti was dug into a foxhole phoning in artillery strikes on Nazi tanks that rumbled through the snow toward his unit.

Fog hovered above the freshly fallen snow that blanketed the Belgian countryside while the air temperature plummeted to zero as the Battle of the Bulge entered its 19th day.

The Germans had broken through Allied lines near Longchamps, a Belgian village about four miles north of Bastogne, Jan. 3, 1944, and the 101st Airborne Division's 502nd Parachute Infantry Regiment was called in to help close the gap.
