# The Pizza MRE Is Finally Coming

The advent of a Pizza Meal, Ready-to-Eat will let every day be pizza day, even in war. Close your eyes. Now, think of the most delicious food imaginable. If you're picturing, say, a hamburger or a bowl of mom's spaghetti, you're wrong. It's pizza, or, as it will soon be known in the military, Meal, Ready-to-Eat No. 37. That's right, a U.S. Army laboratory has just successfully concocted the first

ever field-ready slice. And guess what? It's the real deal. Well, almost. "It's a fully assembled and baked piece of pizza in one package," Lauren Oleksyk, a food technologist at the U.S. Army's research, development, and engineering center in Natick, Massachusetts, told Tech Insider. But unlike a normal, civilian slice of pizza, this one is infused with something called Hurdle technology, which prevents mold from forming and allows the MRE to remain edible for three years at 80 degrees. In other words, if the Terminator were a slice of pizza, this would be it. According to Oleksysk, soldiers can expect the slice to taste like "day after pizza" or the 'za commonly found in school cafeterias across America. As true pizza fans know, those are two of the very best varieties. "We've actually had feedback from the warfighter for years," Oleksysk said. "Pizza just seems appealing to all." Damn right it is. MRE No. 37 is scheduled to make its debut sometime in 2017, at which point deployments will get exponentially more delicious. Until then, everyone will just have to keep fighting over Chili and Macaroni.

150 ANNIVERSARY-- GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC (GAR)

# FIRST OFFICIAL MEMBERSHIP BADGE OF THE GAR.

The original badge was adopted resolution in 1866 and continued in use till 1869, when it was redesigned. The badge was in a modified shield shape, crossed flags and sabers over a drum in the lower half and a cannon and crossed muskets on an anchor in the upper half. On the upper, in center is a "3", on the left is a "B" on the right is an "N". On the lower half is G A R over the flags. This meaning "THIRD BATTALION" GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC can be found in the book "History of George Meade Post No. One, Department of Pennsylvania, GAR, by Joseph Chandler Ward, Phila. 1889." In battle the Third Battalion stood behind the first two battalions to support them. After the war, the GAR saw themselves as part of the shield of the UNION. The regular army was the first battalion, the militia was the second battalion and the GAR was the third battalion or veteran volunteers.

Many veterans had taken their weapons home and they were stored in GAR Posts ready to return to the field should the south attempt to rise again. In his History of the GAR in 1888, Robert Beath comments on these meanings. When the badge is redesigned in 1869 the 3 B N is dropped. This badge was in two known sizes, but numerous materials.

The following ad was in the Great Republic newspaper of Washington D. C.

On January 3, 1867. The Grand Army of the Republic Badge Manufacturing Company, with headquarters at La Fayette, Indiana, are now prepared to furnish Badges of all kinds and qualities at the short notice. We have been designated by the Commander in Chief as the sole and exclusive manufacturer of Badges for the Grand Army. A caveat has been filed and a patent applied for, to protect us from the sharks, who remained in the rear during the war, but are now anxious to step forward and reap the profits of our work. All members of the Badge Company are members of the GAR in good standing. A large per cent of the profits are paid to National Headquarters for charitable purposes. We furnish Badges of the following kinds and prices stated: Silverplated Badges- 50 cents Genuine Silver Badges-\$1.00 heavy Gold Plated Badges-\$2.50 Solid Gold Plated Badges \$10-\$25, according to fineness and enamel. This is the only company authorized to make and sell Badges for the Grand Army.

There are a number of variations of 3BN badges, some in white metal, some in gilt. Many were enameled in red-white-blue, some in black. There are also various shapes, all are not alike.. I did own one that a jeweler had engraved on a gold stick pin. The smaller one was about the size of a dime and the larger one about the size of a quarter.

There were several styles of officer's badges. There is very little known about these

as very few were ever manufactured. Any badge with 3 B N - G A R upon it is extremely rare, and the research for badges and more information continues.





# Gettysburg - Adopt A Monument - Knapp's Battery:

Last year, Camp #15 participated in the Gettysburg National Park "Adopt a Monument Program". The program allows volunteers to adopt a specific monument in the park, and maintain the area around a monument once or twice in the year. Camp #15 adopted Knapp's Battery, which is located on Culp's Hill. Last November, Brothers Greg Kline, Scott Debo, Logan Swanger, and Jeffery Smith met for lunch at Gettysburg and then proceeded to clear the area near the battery which helped widen the view shed along the road and increased the safety for the bikers and autos following the tour route in that area.
