# Message from our Brother in the Field

From Duke Hall 11 Mar 2010
Brothers of the SUVCW, Ladies of the DUVCW,
Members of the Auxiliary and Family and Friends.

Greetings! My name is Duke Hall, new brother to Camp 15, and the grandson of Mr. & Mrs. Lee Walters. I am writing today for several reasons, but before I get into all of that, I'd like to tell you a little about myself.

First off, I'm 27 years old, and hail from the small village of Galena, Ohio, which is about 20 miles north of Columbus. I am a Specialist (E-4) in the United States Army Infantry, and am a member of the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 17<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment, which is part of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Infantry Division, out of Fort Lewis, Washington. I have been in the service for about four years now, and am currently serving in Southern Afghanistan.

I am engaged to a wonderful young lady by the name of Heidi and when I'm not "playing soldier" I enjoy playing guitar, reading, studying history and a stiff drink followed by a strong laugh with good friends.

Now that that's out of the way, I would first like to thank the Brothers of Camp 15 for accepting

my membership application. I am very honored to be associated with an organization with as much history and purpose as the SUVCW. I count myself truly blessed to have such an honor.

Next, I would like to extend a heart-felt "Thank You" on behalf of my fellow squad members, as well as myself, for all of the wonderful and much needed supplies you have sent to us. We use the water heaters daily, and the snacks and beef jerky are extremely welcome after a week of living off of MRE's!\*

We hand out a lot of the pens and candies to the Afghan children we meet: as sad as it may sound, often these pens become their most cherished possession. One of the boxes contained a stick of Alligator jerky, and one of Kangaroo.... I split them 8 ways with my buddies, and we really enjoyed trying them... When you have so little in the way of entertainment, something like that is quite an experience! I also really enjoy reading the news letters you send. The pictures are amazing, and I even saw one of my platoon in there! (that picture was taken on Christmas, and that was also our last day off... we've been quite busy). Again, thank you so much for your generosity! As I'm sure you know (it was in one of the newsletters), the area we are in is right in the middle of the Taliban's back vard... we rarely have the chance to restock on essentials and when we do get to somewhere with a px, it's usually sold out.

Next in the order of business, I figure I'll tell you a little about what we've been doing over here. We deployed [assigned] to Afghanistan in July of 2009. Our mission was to push into the Argandah River Valley region of Khandahar, which is on the Afghan border of Pakistan. No sizable American of NATO force had been there in several years, and the Taliban had fortified Khandahar, as well as neighboring Helmond, so we knew we were in for a fight.

We are the first Stryker\*\* unit to deploy to Afghanistan, so we had no real advice on tactics... we just had to learn the hard way. In the first 120 days of our tour, our unit engaged the enemy over 300 times. Our battalion lost 22 men, of which 12 were from my Company. Over 75 purple hearts\*\*\* have been awarded to our men.

The first several months were the hardest... we spent weeks living in mud huts, fields, hills, mountains, and open desert. Sometimes we'd go a few weeks without hot chow, let alone a shower. We had one phone for over 800 soldiers, so most of us went weeks without hearing from home. Mail

took forever to get here, because it was too dangerous to drive to our base... it had to be flown in

We cleared through the valley, destroying countless IED's, weapons caches, and enemy personnel. Then we held our position until we were relieved by a much larger force from the 82<sup>nd</sup> Airborne Division. After that, our mission changed, and we moved North, to secure a major highway, allowing NATO forces and Afghan Nationals to move freely.

A typical day was us patrolling the area, pulling guard, visiting local villages, and/or over watching areas to deny the enemy terrain.

Though our Company has lost more than 20 men (killed or sent home due to serious injuries), our morale is usually high, though often we're too tired to notice. We are very proud of the fact that we regularly take on tasks that require five or even ten times as many men as we have, but we get the job done regardless.

Oh, on the terrain... where we are, terrain varies massively; mountains, forests, fields, orchards, hills, desert... often times, we're in the mountains one day, orchards and fields the next and desert the day after that. It rarely rains, but when it does, it rains non-stop for days. The longest "monsoon" lasted for over a week!

Well, I have to go for now. This is the 4<sup>th</sup> letter I've \*almost\* finished for all of you, but the other 3 got destroyed. I really need to stop carrying my stationary in my pack when we're wading through rivers, walking through storms (dust or rain), etc.

I hope to meet y'all soon! Your Friend and Brother, Duke Hall

P.S. – On my job... I spent the first half of my tour as a driver of one of our Strykers, now I'm a machine gunner. My lovely lady is working on getting some pictures for you all, of Afghanistan, and of our unit.

#### Editor's Note:

The **Meal, Ready-to-Eat** — commonly known as the **MRE** — is a self-contained, individual field ration in lightweight packaging bought by the United States

military for its servicemembers for use in combat or other field conditions where organized food facilities are not available. The MRE replaced the canned MCI or Meal, Combat, Individual rations in 1981 and is the intended successor to the lighter LRP ration developed by the United States Army for Special Forces and Ranger patrol units in Vietnam. Prior to that, items were known as C-Rations!



The IAV Stryker is a family of eight-wheeled, 4+4-wheel-drive, armored combat vehicles produced by General Dynamics Land Systems, in use by the United States Army. The Stryker is the U.S. Army's first new armored vehicle since the M2/M3 Bradley Fighting Vehicle in the 1980s.



The Purple Heart is a United States

military decoration awarded in the name of the President to those who have been wounded or killed

while serving on or after April 5, 1917 with the U.S. military.

# Memorial Day Message

Silver letters on a black sign spelled out a simple message – "Silence and Respect." I saw the sign on a Good Friday walk through the Soldiers National Cemetery at Gettysburg National Military Park.

While the sign is meant for the cemetery's many visitors, I thought for a long while about its meaning for our nation. With Memorial Day coming up in a few weeks, I wondered if perhaps "Silence and Respect" was more than a gentle plea for a single cemetery, but an urgent mission statement for the whole country.

In 1968, when Congress removed Memorial Day from its traditional observance on May 30 and placed it on the last Monday in May, it placed the solemn day squarely in the path of a people anxious to relax, to frolic, to sunbathe and spend frivolously on a three-day weekend. The resulting stampede was inevitable.

As a participant in several Memorial Day observances, I've listened to dozens of anxious teenagers rush through the important words of The Gettysburg Address and General Logan's Orders, as if they have someplace they'd rather be. I don't blame them, really – they are merely reflecting the priorities of a society that wishes not to linger too long among sad reflections of the dead.

Two national organizations – The Veterans of Foreign Wars and Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War – have long championed returning Memorial Day to its traditional date of May 30, to restore some of its significance and solemnity. In 2002, the VFW issued a statement that read, "Changing the date merely to create three-day weekends has undermined the very meaning of the day. No doubt, this has contributed a lot to the general public's nonchalant observance of Memorial Day." Senator Daniel Inouye of Hawaii, a combat-wounded Medal of Honor

hero of World War II, introduces legislation every year to change the date, but there is little political or public support for such a change.

There are faithful patriots who gather each year to commemorate Memorial Day, and the men and women whose lives give the day its meaning. I see them along the streets and on the front porches of our Valley's towns. They come to our cemeteries to pay their respects, and to remember loved ones whose memories fade with each passing year. All too however, the larger crowds often. elsewhere – asleep in bed because the parade started too early; dashing around the shopping center because the sale is "one day only;" or simply staying at home because the day looks to be too hot or too rainy, or because the yard work just won't wait.

We are of course free to mark Memorial Day as we see fit. In 2001, I took my stepfather, a World War II Navy veteran, to the movies to see "Pearl Harbor" after participating in Sunbury's Memorial Day observance. The movie was long and loud, and not the best film about the events of December 7, 1941. It seemed an appropriate choice, however, given the essential meaning of Memorial Day.

We are free to choose our own course on Memorial Day because of the service and sacrifices of those whose graves we decorate with flags and flowers. We are free to sit, stand, march, or sleep because of those whose sleep is eternal. We are free to enjoy the smoke of backyard barbeques because of those who inhaled the smoke of battle with their last breath.

On Memorial Day 2010, we can choose to trumpet the unofficial beginning of summer, or, with the eyes of Heaven upon us, we can choose to pause, just for a moment, to render honor where honor is due – in silence and respect.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR by Dave Klinepeter MEMORIAL DAY May 30th 1917 (Harrisburg Telegraph)
MEMORIAL DAY SOLEMN WITH NATION AT WAR
Even Greater Tribute Paid Those Who Died In Defense of the U. S; G.A.R. Veterans Are Given Wonderful Ovation In Parade; City Mourns As Bells Are Tolled.

Never since the observance of Memorial Day began far back in 1868, has the day meant so much to both young and old in the United States, as this great country is rapidly completing its preparations for active participation in the war.

Today as the Veterans of the historic Civil War filed down the city streets to the cemeteries to pay tribute to their departed comrades, it was evident that the ceremonies were the most somber, yet the most impressive ever observed in the city. With a deeper and truer meaning a new vision came today to the younger generations as they saw before them, the Boys in Blue, living examples of Patriotism and Loyalty to the Flag. The eye and grayed-head, filled the young men and young women with a more pronounced and more sincere love of country and a greater patriotic devotion to the flag.

During the day circulars were handed out on the streets by the Grand Army of the Republic men, bearing this charge; "young men, your country needs you. The boys of 1861-1865 present to you THE FLAG unsullied, keep it so. Don't be a slacker, but enlist in some branch of the service.. Compliments of the PATRIOT INSTRUCTOR of Hartranft Post 58, G.A.R."

The March meeting was opened by Commander Deppen; the February minutes were read by Secretary Sheibley; and a treasury report of \$1919 was given by Treasurer Demmy. Both reports were approved by the camp.

Saturday 13 March, a few camp members participated in a flag placing ceremony at the grave of Civil War nurse Melinda Spigelmyer in Union County, PA, on Route 45.
