No camp meeting in November due to Remembrance Day activities in Gettysburg and extensive family holiday activities.

Veterans Day, November 11.

We encourage our readers to set aside time to reflect on the sacrifice of our Patriot veterans and honor them accordingly.

On November 11th, 1921, an unknown American soldier from World War I was buried in Arlington National Cemetery, in recognition of WWI veterans and in conjunction with the timing of cessation of hostilities at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). President Warren Harding requested that: "All...citizens...indulge in a period of silent thanks to God for these... valorous lives and of supplication for His Divine mercy...on our beloved country." Inscribed on the Tomb are the words: "Here lies in honored glory an American soldier know but to God." The day became known as "Armistice Day." In 1954, Congress, wanting to recognize the sacrifice of veterans since WWI, proposed to change Armistice Day to Veterans Day in their honor. President Dwight D. Eisenhower, former Supreme Commander in WWII, signed the legislation.

To honor those veterans who sacrificed all, an Army honor guard from the 3d U.S. Infantry (The Old Guard) keeps day and night vigil at Arlington. At 11 a.m. tomorrow, a combined color guard representing all military service branches executes "Present Arms" at the tomb for the laying of a wreath by the president. This is followed by "Taps."

The Defense Department has totaled one measure of the price of liberty -- almost 1.2 million members of our fighting forces have died while in service to our country since the American Revolution; 1.4 million have been wounded. The numbers, of course, offer no reckoning of the inestimable value of these individual citizens' lives, and the sacrifices borne by their families. But we do know their sacrifices defended a precious gift handed down to us -- the liberties we cherish. Every day -- but today especially -- let us always hold our veterans and their families in our hearts.

Remembering our veterans--my story

After graduating from high school in 1944 I, like most young men, wanted to enlist in the service, but because of my poor eye-sight, I was turned down. When the draft came along they reconsidered and inducted me in the Navy as a special assignment (ISA). After training at Bainbridge, Md., my orders sent me to the



Navel Operating Base in Norfolk, Va. My job was working in the Navy Post Office forwarding mail to those who had been transferred. My efforts to try for sea duty were turned aside several One times. officer commented to me, "lf you lost vour

glasses we would have to

throw you overboard", of course we both laughed!! What really hurt was, when two WAVES from our mail unit were shipped to the South Pacific to open a facility to help mail delivery. One Admiral, on my mail route, explained to me how they needed 9 or 10 people to keep the combat troops and sailors supplied and mail was very important.

Needless to say I stayed at the Navel Base till late June 1946. To fill some of my time, I would work at the USO roller skating ring in Norfolk, repairing skates and being a floor manager. I had roller skated before, during and after my Navy service. Actually I met my future wife,. Gloria, at a skating rink after the war. I was discharged in July 1946 but signed up for the U S Navel Reserves –I was discharged in 1954.

I have the utmost respect for all veterans:

Within my family circle: 2 of my mother's brothers and my wife's father served in WWI. My brother John, U S Army, myself U S Navy, my brother Donald, U S Navy, my wife's brother Lee, U S Army, her brother John, U S Navy, all served during WWII. My brother C. Herbert, U S Navy, Korean war. Our sons, Mike and Pat both U S Navy served during the Vietnam period.

Meeting began at 2:02 pm

Dave Demmy, Jr read the meeting notes from the September meeting and the text was approved as read.

No camp meeting in November. Commander Deppen explained the reason why camp does not meet during November: the 3rd Sunday of each November when the camp might meet is generally the weekend for Remembrance Day events.

Our first civil war commitment that weekend should be for Remembrance Day activities!

Patriotic instructor Klinepeter provided another session based on his wealth of knowledge in our order. Brother Klinepeter spoke of the Civil War round table on October 22nd at the Radisson. He made mention of several important dates in military history from events in the Navy, for which Dave is quite familiar with, to the creation of the US Marine Corps. Dave spoke about the colored troops in the war and the effect on the state department to maintain those troops until national would accept them. Brother Dave reminded the camp about the Gettysburg Address reenactment every Nov 19th in Gettysburg and finished his session speaking about the history of Camp Curtin, and reading a small excerpt from the book "The Training of an Army".

With no further business of the camp, Commander Deppen brought the meeting to a close at 3:17pm.

NOVEMBER 11th is a very important date in our United States history.

November 11, 1865 Closing of CAMP CURTIN in Harrisburg, Pa. This year is the 145 anniversary of that closing. The official name of the camp was suggested by then Major Knipe on April 18, 1861. Over the years over 300,000 men went through, going to war. Camp Curtin also served as a hospital, and prisoner of war camp. After the war, despite the absence of public outpouring of sentiment by the public, the return of the various units was not without ceremony. Governor Andrew Curtin and his staff went to the Camp to welcome the veterans and to receive the return of the state battle flags. He would thank them for their devotion to duty and patriotism. The flags would be a memorial to them and what they did, <u>"TO BE PRESERVED AS PART OF YOUR HISTORY IN THE STATE ARCHIVES."</u>

After the war in 1865, Governor Andrew Curtin addressed a group of returning veterans at Camp Curtin. He spoke about the camp being a great site during the war. "The fields upon which we now stand will be known as classic ground, for here has been the great central point of the organizations of our military forces. When my administration of public affairs will have been forgotten and the good and evil will be only known to the investigation of the antiquarian, <u>Camp Curtin with its</u> memories and association will be immortal".

November 11, 1990 The 125 anniversary of the closing of Camp Curtin was remembered with a special program. There was a parade, special guests, including a direct descendant of Governor Curtin, also a special postal envelope. I had the honor of portraying Governor Andrew Curtin and have continued to do so since then, at many affairs. I wander, and hope they will have some type of ceremony for the 150 anniversary of the closing of the camp (2015).

Recommended reading" The Training of an Army", Camp Curtin and the North's Civil War by William Miller. This is a very good history.

November 11, 1918 the end of World War 1

Veterans Day is an annual United States Federal holiday observed on November 11th. It was originally the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice ending World War 1 on the 11 the hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 by the Germans.

On May 13, 1938 Nov 11th was made a legal holiday dedicated to the cause of world peace. On June 1, 1954 congress changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. In 1971, according to the **Uniform Monday Holiday Act**, Veterans Day was changed to the 4th Monday of October. Because of many complaints, especially from veteran groups. In 1978 it was moved back to the original November 11h. Since then there has been a trend not to close for the holidays, including schools. <u>As most of us know we have not been able to get Memorial Day back to where it belongs on May 30th.</u>

No matter what the date is, we need to remember all our VETERANS, They need our support and prayers.

"Before You Go"

By Bierstock, 58, and John Melnick, 54, of Pompano Beach - a member of Bierstock's band, Dr. Sam and the Managed Care Band, have written a song inspired by that old soldier in the airport parking lot. The mournful "Before You Go" does more than salute those who fought in WWII. It encourages people to go out of their way to thank the aging warriors before they die.

"If we had lost that particular war, our whole way of life would have been shot," says Bierstock, who plays harmonica. "The WW II soldiers are now dying at the rate of about 2,000 every day. I thought we needed to thank them."

The song is striking a chord. Within four days of Bierstock placing it on the Web, the song and accompanying photo essay have bounced around nine countries, producing tears and heartfelt thanks from veterans, their sons and daughters and grandchildren.

"It made me cry," wrote one veteran's son. Another sent an e-mail saying that only after his father consumed several glasses of wine would he discuss "the unspeakable horrors" he and other soldiers had witnessed in places such as Anzio, Iwo Jima, Bataan, and Omaha Beach. "I can never thank them enough," the son wrote. "Thank you for thinking about them."

Already they have been invited to perform it in Houston for a Veterans' Day tribute - this after just a few days on the Web. They hope every veteran in America gets a chance to hear it.
