Arrive early to have your membership badge draped in black in honor of our lost Brothers during 2016.

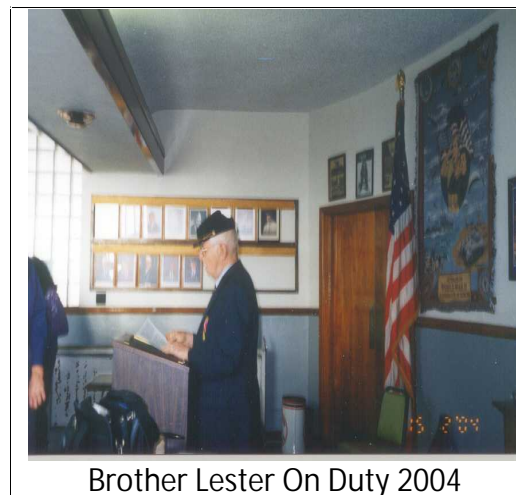

2. Brother Floyd is survived by our three brothers of Camp 15, David W. Demmy Sr., David Demmy Jr. and Jonathan Demmy. Also surviving are daughters Deborah Livingston and Heidi Stanalonis, three additional grandchildren, and two great grandchildren.
3. As many of you know well, Brother Floyd was a World War II Army combat veteran, serving in the European Theater. [ETO]! Specifically he served on a half-track squad of Company B, of the 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, 10th Armored Tiger Division [Among General George Patton's Third Army]. He was the recipient of the Bronze Star, the Europe-Africa-Middle East Medal, with two bronze combat stars, WWII Victory Medal and the Combat Infantry Badge. On many occasions Brother Floyd favored us with stories pertaining to his experiences in World War II.
4. In addition to being a combat veteran and fellow brother of Camp 15, Floyd had many other interests as well. He was an avid gardener, a member of the Harrisburg First Assembly of God, a writer of exquisite poetry and memorable to many of us, a master story teller. Brother Floyd was also a concerned keeper of his fellow man, both in the kind and thoughtful words he expressed, and generous deeds.

Dear Brothers of Camp 15,

Here we are again, nearing the end of the summer and looking forward to the Fall of 2016. I hope your summer has been an enjoyable one. Although most of us regret to see another summer of our lives pass behind, the Autumn season can be a pleasant one, filled with color, beautiful crisp days, and more temperate days of weather ahead. Of course Fall also is the season where our SUVCW, Camp 15 meetings begin, starting on the third Sunday in September and October, capping off with our annual Christmas Party in early December. I hope to see many of you in the September and October meetings fast approaching.

In addition to those formal meetings, the Camp will be involved with some very enjoyable, and yes, rewarding outside activities. As some of you may know, Camp #15 is a Participant in the Gettysburg National Battlefield Park's Program "*Adopt a Position*". We have adopted "Knapp's Battery" on Culp's Hill. Last year, during a beautiful Fall day, several Camp #15 brothers had lunch together at "Gettysburg Eddies" (and yes, enjoyed a couple of beers along with lunch) and went to Culp's Hill afterward. There we did some trimming and increased the visibility on the downside of the slope, resulting in a safer passage for bikers and autos in the Culp's Hill Loop. In process, we discovered the July 2 and 3rd location of the 6th Wisconsin Infantry Regiment, which many of you may know as perhaps the most famous regiment of the "Iron Brigade". There, as we cleared the brush away we found the 6th Wisconsin marker, and constructed earthworks of that very brave and famous regiment. Beside that discovery, we brothers had a lot of fun just being together, and had some good laughs and plenty of good hearted joking to go around as well. This year, we will return on some Saturday in October or November. I really encourage you brothers of Camp 15 to join us again on Culp's Hill, and I most certainly can guarantee that you will have a fun and enjoyable time. Another outside event this fall is the Annual Gettysburg "Remembrance Day" Parade. Coincidentally this year it falls on November 19, which happens to be exactly the very day that

the Gettysburg address was given. That only happens once every seven years. If you have never been to the Gettysburg "Remembrance Day" Parade, it is a must see event. During the day, starting at 1:00 PM the Gettysburg Parade kicks off Le Fever Street in Gettysburg.

Thousands of people participate/march in the parade. Descendants of Union and Confederate soldiers march albeit separately in their camps. Both Sons and Daughters march. Flags are flying, and batteries roll down the street pulled by horses. Cavalry rides down the street with carbines and swords (it is a good idea to walk ahead of instead of behind the horses, as you may have to look out for piles if you walk behind!); ladies are in hoop skirts, and men are in civil war uniforms both Blue and Grey. Brother David Klinepeter is likely to be present, in top hat and coat tails, portraying wartime Governor Andrew Curtin. It is truly a memorable event. During the day, the Gettysburg Address will be read, followed by a key note speaker. Past speakers have included Neil Armstrong, and Steven Spielberg.

In the evening of Remembrance Day, there is the annual "Illumination"; 3,600 candles are placed, lit and flicker over the graves of the union fallen of the battle. Each name of those brave and honorable soldiers are read aloud starting at dusk. I guarantee if you go, it is a sight you will not forget; and to hear their names spoken aloud, reminds you that they were living and breathing human beings, just as we are, with dreams, and loved ones in this world; they sacrificed everything on this earth, so that, in the words of Lincoln, "so that, that nation might live". If any of you brothers are interested in preparing and lighting the candles, or reading some of the names on the list (15 min reading) let me know, and I will contact the organizer for the Gettysburg Foundation to get you on the list. My daughter, Ilsa and I do this every year, and it is a humbling honor, to light those candles, and to read those names.

I hope many of you brothers [and families] will come to this fall's meetings or join us in these two outside events discussed above. Please contact

The second registration, held a year later, on 5 June 1918, was for men who had turned 21 since the last registration or who hadn't registered during the first registration for whatever reason. The third registration was held just a few months later, on 12 September 1918, and extended the draft registration ages!

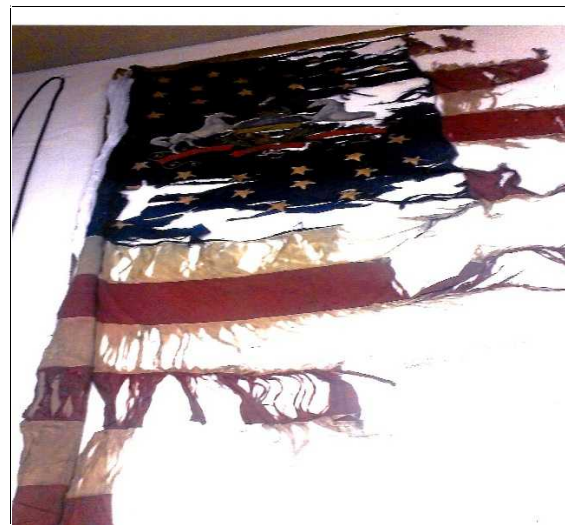

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR/GAR HISTORIAN

At our September meeting I am looking forward to a report on the SUVCW State Encampment from Greg Kline and also a report on the National Encampment of the SUVCW from David Demmy.

On July 30th I had an unusual experience. Went to New Freedom, Pa and rode the Civil War train. It was a Confederate train raid week end. General Robert E. Lee was at the Confederate camp site and Mrs. Robert E. Lee was alone at the train station. Governor Curtin offered to escort Mrs. Lee on the ride. I protected her from the Yankee's and she protected me from the raiders. We were able to talk to the riders about the problems of our day, of course some of the opinions differed in beliefs. Later on I was able to talk with several gentlemen about the SUVCW. There was also a Civil War Ball run by Brother Larry Keener Farley and the Victorian Dance Ensemble. On August 6th, as Governor Curtin, I was invited to Duncannon, Pa for a reunion of the Pennsylvania Bucktails. There were over 70 members plus families attending. There were a number of the fellows wearing their

SUVCW membership badges, several were from New York State.

On August 13th Our Victorian Dance Ensemble danced at Gettysburg, Pa; first at the Dobbin House in the morning and then the National Military Park in the afternoon. Always at affairs such as this I carry business cards from our Executive Director, David Demmy. I have also given a number of Brother Swanger's research info folders to people wondering how or where to find records for Civil War veterans.

September 11th is now PATRIOT DAY and everyone is asked to fly your AMERICAN FLAG. Back in my time we had "Pearl Harbor" now they have Sept 11th and New York.--- let us never forget. DJK

150TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE GRAND ARMY OF the REPUBLIC

August 28-Sept 1, 1949 the 83rd and Last National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, Indianapolis, Ind. The Commander in Chief was Theodore Penland. General Hartranft Camp 15 of Harrisburg, Pa was there. Major John H. Runkle took a number of the

6 Infantry Field Music Penna Brigade Sons of Veterans Reserves (Harrisburg Fife and Drum Corps) along. Your Patriotic Instructor was one of those. We drove in three cars. One afternoon, Major Runkle took the Drum Corp down to the GAR Headquarters to entertain the six attending GAR Civil War Veterans. Only one, Albert Woolson came down for dinner. He was attended by a registered nurse and an M.P.; Major Runkle placed a drum between Albert Woolson's legs, gave him drum sticks and he played along with us for a number of Civil War songs. I am sure this brought back many memories for Woolson.

At this National Encampment of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Pennsylvania Major John H. Runkle, of Camp 15, Harrisburg, was installed as Commander In Chief. djk

GAR MEMBERSHIP BADGES

In the last newsletter I showed the first membership badge.

At a special meeting of the National Encampment in New York City on October 27-28 1869 they adopted a new membership badge. Enclosed see a copy of the original information sent to every GAR

Post. A short time later complaints came in, stating that it looked too much like the Medal of Honor given during the war. Several years later it was modified. I will show those in the next newsletter. djk

Headquarters Grand Army of the Republic.

Quartermaster General's Office,

Washington, February 18, 1870.

CIRCULAR }
No. 1.

The annexed cut represents the badge of the Grand Army of the Republic, as adopted at a special meeting of the National Encampment, held in New York city on the 27th and 28th days of October, 1869, under the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That the design of badge submitted to the Council of Administration be adopted, and that the badges shall be cast from bronze composed of cannon captured during the late rebellion; and be it

"Resolved, That the Quartermaster General be authorized to contract with A. Demarest, of New York city, for the badge above adopted, upon condition that the Grand Army of the Republic shall have the sole legal right to the patent of said badge, and that it be furnished to Comrades at a sum not to exceed one dollar and fifty cents each."

In conformity with the above, a patent of the badge has been secured to National Headquarters, and the contract for their manufacture awarded to Mr. Demarest. These badges will be ready for delivery on the 18th instant at \$1.50 each, and can only be obtained through these Headquarters. All orders for small numbers must be accompanied with the money. Large orders will be filled and forwarded by express, C. O. D. All letters relative to the badge must be addressed to Col. Timothy Luby, No. 411 F Street, Washington, D. C.

DESCRIPTION

OF THE AUTHORIZED

Badge of the Military Order

OF THE

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

THE BADGE is of bronze, made from cannon captured in different decisive battles during the late rebellion, and in form a five-pointed star, similar in design to the two hundred medals of honor authorized by act of Congress to be given soldiers and sailors most distinguished for meritorious and gallant conduct during the late rebellion.

The design, as here given, and adopted by the Grand Army of the Republic, was arranged by General F. A. STARRING, Inspector General of the Order, and is described as follows:

THE OBVERSE.

In the centre of the Badge is a figure of the Goddess of Liberty, representing LOYALTY; on either side, a Soldier and Sailor clasping hands, representing FRATERNITY, and two little Children receiving benediction and assurance of protection from the Comrades, etc., representing CHARITY. On each side of the group is the National Flag and the Eagle, representing FREEDOM, and the Axe and Bundle of Rods, or Fasces, representing UNION. In each point of the Star is the insignia of the various arms of the service, viz: the *Bugle* for Infantry, *Cross Cannon* for Artillery, *Cross Muskets* for the Marine, *Cross Swords* for Cavalry, and the *Anchor* for Sailors. Over the central group are the words "Grand Army of the Republic," and under, the word and figures "1861—Veteran—1866," commemorating the commencement and close of the rebellion, and also the date and organization of the Order.

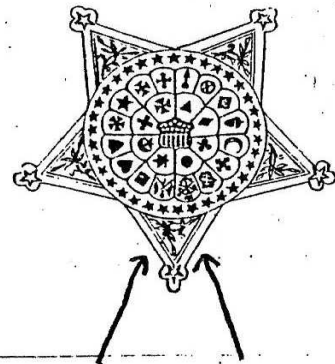
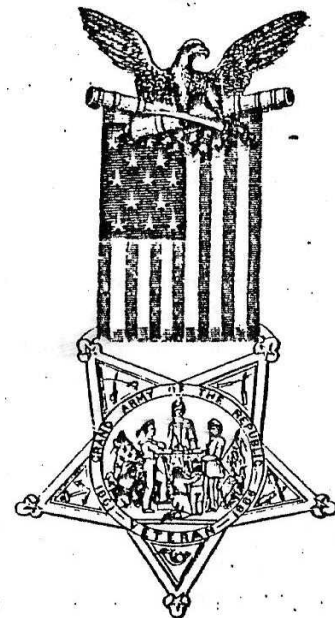
THE REVERSE SIDE

Represents a Branch of Laurel—the crown and reward of the brave—in each point of the Star. The National Shield in the centre, surrounded by the twenty-four recognized Corps Badges numerically arranged, each on a Keystone, and all linked together, showing they are united, and will guard and protect the shield of the Nation. Around the Centre is a circle of Stars, representing the States of the Union and the Departments composing the Grand Army of the Republic.

THE CLASP

Is composed of the figure of an Eagle, with Cross Cannon and Ammunition, representing DEFENCE; the Eagle with drawn sword hovering over and always ready to protect from insult or dishonor the NATIONAL FLAG, which is also the Emblem and RIBBON of the Order.

135th National Encampment at Springfield IL by David Demmy

Only 6 Brothers of our Department of Pennsylvania traveled to the encampment in honor of the birthplace of the GAR and sponsored by the Department of Illinois.

Pennsylvania is the largest of all of the 30 departments that make up our grand patriotic organization, 1 of 5 allied orders of the GAR and we could not muster up enough votes to reelect our Brother Richard Orr, for another term as our national treasurer and crusader to IRS for our upgrade from 501 (C4) to 501 (C3) to allow donations to us as tax deductible for the donors, among other reasons and objectives of being a (C3) organization. While greater than 200 Brothers were registered to attend the encampment, only 182 were in the room at the time of voting and only after attendance was taken prior to the voting process to assure that only those present at the assembly are entitled to vote.

Brother Rich, nearly single-handedly campaigned to the IRS with the tons of paperwork and previously submitted audits and forms that the IRS continued to stone wall our non-profit organization.

Brother David McReynolds of TN is the newly elected treasurer. Don Martin of OH, Mark Day of VA and Don Shaw of MI were elected as CinC, SVC, and JVC respectively. Ed Norris, MA is the appointed Chief of Staff to Don Martin.

Future sites for national encampment are

2017 – Lansing Michigan at Radisson August 10-13, 2017

2018 – Boston, Mass at Sheraton Framingham Hotel 9 -14, 2018

2019 – Perhaps at Branson, Missouri further data TBA, and,

2020 – Perhaps near Penn State. In the near future, the Department of Pennsylvania will be submitting their bid to host the 2020 convention.

Queries and resolutions to change the national policy requiring Dual Brothers to remit 2nd and 3rd national per capita to each Camp they may have joined, was not passed.
