Secretary Greg Kline read and summarized a lengthy list of National and Department orders which were issued since the Camp's last business meeting in May. Communication was received regarding the Camp's license from National allowing us to sell our belt buckles and license plates as fund raisers. The licenses were renewed by the Council of Administration in August for another two years.

Unfinished Business:

Camp 15's Bylaws have been amended to include changes being required by the Pennsylvania Department which is required in our continuing effort to obtain 501 ©3 status from the IRS. A few other housekeeping changes were made as well. The draft of the new Bylaws has been approved by the Camp Council and Officers and copies were distributed to the Membership. Motion to accept the revised minutes was made by Brother Greg Kline, 2nd by Brother Tony Kline, motion approved.

Brother Jeff Smith gave an update regarding our speaker program at the October meeting. Dr. Schroder, an orthopedic surgeon, will be presenting a program on Civil War medicine. 
Patriotic Instructor:

He discussed the percentages of fatalities during the war from various causes...gunshot, artillery, disease, etc. He mentioned the use, or lack thereof, of bayonets in combat as well as their use as a psychological weapon. He also discussed the role of Major Letterman, head of the medical corps of the Army of the Potomac, who was the first to implement the triage system in army field hospitals.



Medical Treatment in the Civil War



Dr. Jonathan Letterman - 1863

"Every day, I stop and give thanks to Jonathan Letterman". These are the words of the director of medical services during World War II. These are the words on one officer thanking another officer, another doctor thanking another doctor. What is truly amazing is that they were being expressed by a doctor to Dr. Jonathan Letterman, Medical Director of the Army of the Potomac, a full 80 years after Dr. Letterman had resigned from the US Army. What was it that Dr. Letterman did, to merit such a comment nearly a century later? How many people have the honor to be not only remembered, but praised for their efforts so many years later?

Major Jonathan Letterman was 38 years old during the battle of Gettysburg, and had been born in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania, in the south western part of the state, near the Ohio border. In some ways, it was not so surprising that he would become a doctor. His father was a renowned Doctor and Surgeon in the area. Jonathan first attended Jefferson College, and then Jefferson Medical College thereafter. He became a surgeon and graduated from the Medical College at age 25. Upon graduation Dr. joined the army, and did his tour of duty in areas on the frontier where confrontations with the Native Americans were not uncommon. One can imagine how valuable those

experiences must have been, as he treated soldiers for their wounds and learned at an accelerated rate as compared to what would have been the case had he not joined the army. When the Civil War broke out in 1861 and until his resignation at the end of 1863, Dr. Letterman was not the Director of the Army's Medical Core, but rather one tier down in the organization, where he would have the most impact on a day to day, operational effect basis. In 1862 General George B. McClellan appointed him Medical Director of the Army of the Potomac, when McClellan was dissatisfied with the standard to care the soldiers received after the 7 days battles on the Peninsula. The benefits of that decision would pay off during the battle of Antietam when after battle mortality rates dropped sharply as compared to the seven days.

What specifically did Letterman do to have such an impact? Here are just a few of his initiatives:

- Began the modern Triage System we use today

 Segregate Soldiers into three categories: 1. Those for who there is no hope
 but make them comfortable 2. Those who can be saved, but need immediate treatment 3. Those can be saved, and do not need immediate treatment
- Establish Medical Stations Immediately behind the front lines, so lifesaving care can be given as soon as possible, hence saving lives
- Establish Medical Hospitals further back, at the Division and Corps level, where more involved surgeries and treatments can be undertaken; the best doctors were posted in these areas, where their skills would be most needed
- Relieve the stress on Medical Resources by removing those soldiers who can be moved to other areas, where they can be given better and more frequent care, but have those soldiers who should not be moved remain in the immediate area – this was done at the battle of Gettysburg – wounded soldiers who could be moved were moved to Washington, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and New York. Those who were more critical would remain at Camp Letterman, until a later time when they could

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be moved safely. Today, if you drive east on York Pike just outside Gettysburg, look out your window, and you will see a marker for Camp Letterman about 2 miles outside of town. Also look across the street, and you will see railway tracks. There were railway tracks there during the war too. Those tracks carried the wounded union soldiers to the major cities mentioned above, where the medical resources would not be stretched so thin.

- He ignored orders that would result in the • pointless death of wounded troops. At Gettysburg, Letterman, and his next in command at the 12th Corp level, ignored Meade's orders not to bring up Medical supplies, but subordinated their delivery to more artillery ammo than needed, food, and other items. While they did not push the medical supplies ahead of all other logistics, they waited a reasonable amount of time, and pushed the supplies up ahead, not paying attention to the letter of the order; it seems that General Meade was not as concerned about wounded soldiers as General McClelland had been. Letterman was often frustrated with Meade.
- He recognized the idea of the "golden hour" in treating wounded soldiers quickly— he would prioritize the speed in which soldiers would receive treatment

All the procedures above, and many more, not mentioned, resulted in many soldiers surviving their wounds. Jonathan Letterman through his skill, energy, and initiative, probably saved more lives than any other soldier in the union army. He did this in spite of many obstacles, frustrations, ignorance, and lack of appreciation. There would probably be many more graves in Gettysburg Military Cemetery today, if not for the wisdom of Dr. Letterman. A direct quote form Dr. Letterman gives some insight into this:

"Surgeon John McNulty, medical director of that corps, reports that 'it is with extreme satisfaction that I can assure you that it enabled me to remove the wounded from the field, shelter, feed them, and dress their wounds within six hours after the battle ended, and to have every capital operation performed within twentyfour hours after the injury was received.' I can, I think, safely say that such would have been the result in other corps had the same facilities been allowed—a result not to have been surpassed, if equaled, in any battle of magnitude that has ever taken place.'"

God bless you Dr. Letterman. We, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, from a distance of 155 years, can say with gratitude in our hearts, thank you, and God Bless you Dr. Letterman. Dr. Letterman died at the young age of 47, heartbroken at the loss of his wife, to follow her quickly into death. He is now resting in Arlington, alongside his wife, who he loved dearly. May he rest there in peace, and may God Bless and keep his soul for eternity. God grant, that we see him someday, in the world beyond this, and that we may thank him, and shake his hand warmly.


